

Seminar Themes

The following themes provide a framework for the seminar activities.

Global Perspective - Watershed management challenges are not unique to any part of the world. Participants in the seminar will bring global breadth to the program with selected presentations discussing their management interests and concerns.

The Watershed as a Management Unit

“Watersheds are nature’s boundaries.” The land and water resources of a drainage basin are connected, and actions that affect one resource will affect others. Management activities must be evaluated within the constraints and opportunities defined by the watershed boundary. Discussions during the seminar will focus on recognizing the drainage basin as a management unit.

Management Prescriptions Based on Sound Science

- Basin management prescriptions and evaluations demand the application of sound scientific tools and techniques. Demonstrations and discussions during the seminar will highlight specific examples from Wisconsin, and offer participants the opportunity to discuss similar situations from their own experience.

Partnership and Stakeholder Involvement

- Planning goals and their implementation will be more effective when political, social and economic questions are recognized as part of basin management concerns. The seminar will explore the involvement of federal, state, and local governments, and non-governmental organizations in watershed-level planning.



SEMINAR EXPENSES

A fee of \$4,000 (US) will be charged and includes registration and tuition, instruction and materials, lodging, all in-country transportation, and all food accommodations.

Air travel expenses to and from the seminar are the responsibility of participants (see "Travel Arrangements" below). It is also recommended that participants arrive with at least \$300 (US) for incidental expenses. Costs cover health insurance while participants are in the U.S.

TRAVEL ARRANGEMENTS

Participants should plan to arrive in Milwaukee, Wisconsin on Saturday, June 14, 2003. The first official activity of the seminar is luncheon, discussion and tour on Sunday. There will be a get-acquainted social and meal Sunday evening. Air travel arrangements should be made to arrive at Milwaukee. The seminar will conclude Saturday afternoon, June 28 in Milwaukee.

SEMINAR GUIDELINES

The International Seminar on Watersheds Management is a technical and professional course. Participants are selected without regard to sex, race, creed, or nationality, and are considered students of the College of Natural Resources, University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. All participants will share educational facilities, modes of transportation, and lodging without discrimination and will have equal opportunity for participation in the seminar.

All participants are expected to enter into seminar discussions following each major presentation, as well as participate in field exercises and small group activities.

Participants should be prepared to make a brief presentation on watershed management issues in their country, and must be prepared to lead discussions regarding special challenges, problems, and successes which they have experienced. Details on presentation requirements will be sent in the pre-seminar registration packet.

The seminar is offered in English only. Participants with limited English skills are not encouraged to apply.

APPLICATIONS

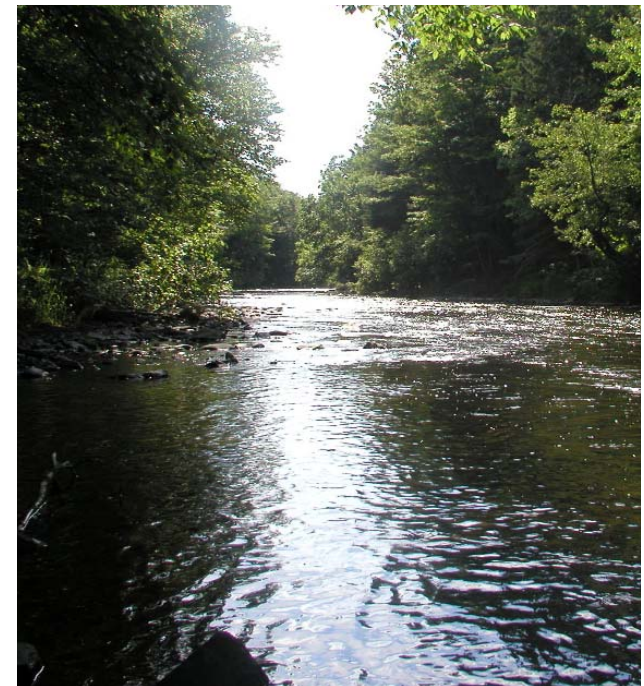

INTRODUCTION

The seminar is an intensive, interactive training program designed for senior watershed management professionals who desire to improve their understanding of the variety of tools and techniques available in integrated watershed management.

The 14-day study tour incorporates a mixture of instruction and facilitated discussions to address the needs and challenges facing watershed managers and administrators. The course will present a broad spectrum of watershed management techniques and institutional arrangements so that participants may gather and compare management opportunities and ideas which can assist in the management of their lands.

The seminar focuses on governmental and non-governmental organizational strategies and methods to develop, manage, and conserve watershed resources for the sustained delivery of goods and services to meet the full range of human needs.

Invited participants are selected to reflect the widest possible geographic distribution and diversity of experience. Particular emphasis is placed on developing nations, but the seminar welcomes representatives from more developed countries.

SEMINAR OBJECTIVES

Through academic instruction, classroom discussions, field tours, and participant presentations, the seminar aims to accomplish three major objectives:

- Demonstrate the viability of the watershed as a planning and management unit for sustained resources management.
- Explore the requirements necessary for institutional cooperation to meet diverse management goals by fostering partnerships, encouraging grass-roots organization, and developing environmental education strategies.
- Generate an international dialogue on key issues in watershed resources management to promote an awareness of universal problems or opportunities.

LOCATION

The seminar will begin and end in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. We will travel throughout the state of Wisconsin, observing a variety of state, federal and NGO watershed conservation and management strategies.

INSTRUCTIONAL STAFF

The seminar is under the direction of Dr. Earl Spangenberg, Professor in the College of Natural Resources. He is assisted by other academic faculty, personnel from the U.S. Forest Service, and professionals from many other natural resource organizations.
