ASLC offers volunteer internships to students who are either currently enrolled in an accredited vocational program, college or university or to those individuals who have graduated from an accredited institution. Although college credit may be obtained from the student's college or university, individuals are not required to gain college credit to participate in the program. All internships require a minimum commitment of twelve weeks for 40 hours a week, although there are a few with a longer time commitment. Please check the specific intern description for further details and time requirements.

International students are also eligible to apply but will require the necessary U.S. J-1 Visa and/or permits to participate. Please check with the U.S. embassy to see what requirements you would need to fulfill to participate in the program if you would be selected for an internship.

To apply for the internship program, individuals need to submit a cover letter, application, resume, writing sample (if applicable), and two letters of reference. We will be accepting applications between October 1, 2009 – February 1, 2010. Applications received after the application deadline date will not be considered. Applications should be e-mailed to the address listed on the internship description. Letters of reference must be sent directly to this e-mail address by the author with the applicants name written in the subject line. Reports to: Dive Safety Officer and Senior Education Manager

Job Summary: This position assists the Dive Officer in developing and administering the dive policies and programs at the Center. The intern will be integrated into the department with assigned duties allowing him or her to progressively assume increasing responsibility. This position will split their 40 hours per week between the Dive Program and the Education Department at the center. When not working with the Dive Program the intern will be participating in floor interpretation with the public through conversation, providing programming and giving presentations.

Requirements: Applicants must be currently enrolled in an accredited college or university with a primary area of study in a dive-related field such as biology, physiology, marine biology, oceanography, physical education or outdoor studies. Recent (within the last two years) college graduates may also apply. Applicants must be certified as rescue divers by a nationally recognized certifying agency and be a current, active, Scientific Diver (by AAUS standards) able to provide a letter of reciprocity. Preference may be given to applicants holding advanced certifications, broader dive experiences, and other dive-related skills or dive-equipment servicing abilities. Applicants should have strong public speaking skills and presentation experience as well. Applicants must have the ability to understand and follow written and oral instruction, and have effective communication skills. Applicants should be agile, have a good sense of balance in order to maneuver around the exhibits and holding areas, and must be able to lift at least 50 pounds. Applicants must possess the ability to adapt to an ever-changing work environment, and be available to work weekends and holidays. Public speaking skills are highly encouraged.

Duties Include:

- Assisting in staff diving functions which may include training in exhibit maintenance, dive tending, dive cylinder filling, planning and logistical support of dives, diving safety, and emergency procedures.
- Managing dive gear and assisting in the logistics of group dives.
- Maintaining and repairing dive equipment and maintaining logs of equipment maintenance and repair.
- Coordinating exhibit maintenance schedules with curators and scheduling maintenance dives.

These are full time positions for twelve weeks available May 15 – September 15.

Reports to: Research Coordinator and Program Manager

Job Summary: This intern will use remotely controlled cameras from a desktop computer to assist with census counts, behavioral observations, video processing and recording, and data entry and proofing for the harbor seal remote monitoring project. This intern may also be conducting census counts and behavioral observations of harbor seals from tour boats visiting Kenai Fjords National Park. He/she will be encouraged to contribute to the evolution and methodology of research data collection methods, and work on additional projects when the opportunities arise. The intern will also be responsible for presenting educational information to, and interacting with, the public.

Requirements: Applicants must be currently enrolled in an accredited college or university or a recent graduate, within the last two years, with a primary area of study in the field of Zoology, Biology, or any other science related field. Candidates should exhibit a strong interest in animal related research, and be comfortable and effective operating computers and using unfamiliar software. Applicants must be willing and able to work on board boats (>25 ft) for long days (9-10 hours) in potentially inclement weather. Applicants should possess the ability to work for extended periods of time while staying focused on the job at hand. Applicants must be prompt with daily duties and follow a very regimented schedule of observations and data collection. Applicants must be willing to interact with the public and give presentations about the research project they are working with. Preference will be given to conscientious, dependable and self-motivated team players who comprehend the overall goal of a project, yet take pride in doing a tough job on small, simple, and repetitive tasks. Applicants must possess the ability to adapt to an ever-changing work environment, and be available to work weekends and holidays. Applicants must have the ability to follow written and oral instruction, and have effective communication skills.
