

High School Writers' Workshop

General Information

Join the Department of English on Wednesday, December 4, 2019!

This event is for students who love to write. Students will attend writing workshops led by English Department faculty, experience a reading by a published writer, be introduced to our student-staffed publishing house, participate in group writing activities, and have an opportunity to share their work at open mic. Emerging creative writers will learn about the educational opportunities linked to an education in Literature, English Education, and Writing, Editing, and Publishing!

Interested students must submit a written work in one of five genres. Department faculty will then use the submissions to assign students to workshops. Additionally, faculty will find one exceptional senior from each genre and honor those students with \$1000 scholarships to attend UW-Stevens Point next year!

The submission deadline is Friday, November 1, 2019. See the Genres, Submission Requirements and Entry Form below for additional information. There is no registration fee to attend. When the number of entries received is over the capacity for the event, acceptance will be based on the quality of writing.

The genre chosen will, for the most part, determine the student's workshop placement at the event, but the amount of entries received overall will also determine placement. Students may submit to more than one genre and may be able to attend two different workshops (depending on submissions received). Genre descriptions are below and instructions for the submission are on the following page.

Genres

THE FAMILIAR ESSAY

The familiar essay has a long history. Famous authors, such as Montaigne, Virginia Woolf, David Sedaris, James Baldwin, and Roxane Gay, have worked in this genre. The subject of the familiar essay is <u>anything under the sun that interests and amuses the essayist</u>, but it must also interest the reader. The familiar essayist writes about what other people think, feel, and experience: the difficulties of growing up, the pain and joy of first love, the sorrow of loss, and the delight of discovery. Never definitive, always personal, this type of writing should be light, informal and conversational.

Submission requirement: Essay may range from 500 to 1200 words.

OUTDOOR ESSAY

Outdoor essays focus on humans' interaction with the natural world. The topic of these non-fiction essays must be <u>outdoor-oriented</u> and <u>involve activities that reflect the natural world</u>. Acceptable topics are those such as hiking, camping, hunting, fishing, canoeing, birding, etc. Topics that do not fit this category are those such as disc golfing, downhill skiing, wakeboarding, etc.

Submission requirement: Essay may be written in first-person and range from 500-750 words.

THE SHORT STORY

The short story may be on any subject but should avoid contrived plots, falsely happy endings, sentimentality, and formulaic writing. Instead, try to write stories that attempt to deal honestly and clearly with the problems and pleasures of being human. Consider telling stories grounded in your own experiences or the experiences of people you know.

Submission requirement: One story up to 20 pages on any subject.

SPECULATIVE FICTION

Speculative Fiction includes such sub-genres as <u>science fiction</u>, <u>fantasy</u>, <u>horror</u>, <u>supernatural fiction</u>, <u>superhero fiction</u>, <u>utopian</u> and <u>dystopian fiction</u>, <u>apocalyptic</u> and <u>post-apocalyptic</u> fiction and alternate histories. Speculative fiction stories may be on any subject but should avoid contrived plots, false happy endings, sentimentality, and formula writing.

Submission requirement: One story of up to twenty-five pages.

POETRY

In selecting participants, we look for poems that are well-crafted and exciting, poems that show a strong use of imagery and concrete detail, precise diction, a sense of the rhythms of language, and the ability to create striking metaphors. Form and theme should interact.

Submission requirements: At least four and no more than seven <u>original</u> poems, that are clean, legible manuscripts.

Submission Requirements

Examine details and directions for each of the five genres and prepare your entry. Each entry must include the required information and have an entry form with it. Each writing submission requires its own entry form. Writings with missing information will not be accepted. All submissions must be mailed to the following address. Emailed entries will not be accepted, and submissions will not be returned (ensure you have a copy).

Deadline: Friday, November 1, 2019.

- Must include an entry form (filled out completed and printed clearly) for each writing submission.
- Must be typed, double-spaced and on numbered pages (poetry may be single-spaced).
- Must include the author's <u>typed</u> name and school name in the upper right-hand corner of each page of the writing.
- Students are advised to keep a copy of each entry in case of loss.
