FINANCIAL AID VOCAB CHEAT SHEET



Financial aid has a language all its own – one with lots of acronyms and industry-specific terms that can sound scary. This glossary will take some of the mystery out of these terms and help you make the best decisions about your financial aid offer.



Expected Family Contribution (EFC):

The amount that the federal government believes your family can contribute to one year of college. This is not the amount you are expected to pay. Colleges use this, among other things, to determine financial need and the types of aid available to you.

Cost of Attendance(COA):

An estimate of how much it costs to attend a college. The COA includes the price of tuition and fees, housing and meals, books and supplies and other expenses associated with attending that school. Learn about our COA here.

Financial need:

The difference between Expected Family Contribution (EFC) and a college's Cost of Attendance (COA).

Net price:

How much it will cost you to attend a school for one year after your scholarships and grants are subtracted from the COA.

Student Aid Report (SAR):

This report shows you what you reported is on your FAFSA, some information about the aid for which you may be eligible and your Expected Family Contribution (EFC). See a sample SAR here.

Subsidized loan:

A need-based loan on which you don't pay interest while you're enrolled at least half-time in school.

Unsubsidized loan:

A loan for which you don't have to demonstrate financial need, but you're responsible for the interest.

Scholarship/Grant:

A monetary gift that doesn't have to be repaid. This can be one-time or renewable, and based on grades, talents or other criteria.

Work-study:

A need-based award for students to apply for a parttime job and earn a bi-weekly paycheck.
