Handling Absences for COVID and Other Illnesses

ur campus and community continue to see rising COVID cases, as well as other illnesses, that are causing students to be absent from classes. We have seen an increase in students reaching out to the Office of the Dean of Students and Student Health Service requesting absence verification or excuse notes. When students or instructors reach out to us about excused absences, we share the following:

Specifically, "If you are absent from classes because of emergencies, offcampus trips, illness, or the like, your instructors will give you a reasonable amount of help in making up the work you have missed."


When it comes to requiring doctors' notes for verification of illness, this is coming from a place of privilege that we would not advise. Student Health Service does not provide excuse notes for students to miss class. Our community healthcare providers have also expressed concern about students calling them for notes. If students are uninsured, underinsured, or even if they have insurance and have co-pays, requiring this note can place an unnecessary financial burden on students. For providers, these requests take time away from other critical patient care. The nature of the illness may not even require a visit to the doctor or urgent care.

Current CDC guidance states that individuals who have tested positive for **COVID** should self-isolate for a period of five days from symptom onset. Individuals should continue to wear a well-fitting mask for another five days. Many other illnesses affect our campus community, such as flu, mono, strep, and other viruses that may cause students to miss classes.

Especially given what we have learned during the pandemic, we hope attendance policies continue to be identified and adjusted with the above guidance in mind. While we understand deadlines are important and students are expected to do their part academically, emergencies come up and it is best to trust the student is being truthful and assist as reasonably as possible.




he videorecording of the keynote presentation from the UWSP Teaching Conference is available through our **website** along with submitted session content.

ome simple adjustments can be made to improve navigation in Canvas courses. CITL team members strongly recommend downloading the UWSP Online Course Template from Canvas Commons. Click on Canvas Commons on the left menu in Canvas. Search 'UWSP Online' to locate the UWSP Online Course Template, then click 'Import/Download' and select the courses you would like to import the template into. The Template is filled with useful information, as well as a START HERE module and a STUDENT RESOURCES module ready to be used in your course.
