Conference To Highlight Social Justice Work

ver the last several years, the ongoing effects of the COVID-19 pandemic have brought to the forefront many of the longstanding social justice issues present in higher education and beyond. While the pandemic may be coming to an end, the desire to address social justice concerns in higher education is becoming part of the new normal, particularly as institutions work to adapt to increasingly diverse student populations. Across our campus, faculty and staff are working to identify and address issues involving race, gender identity, sexuality, income level, ability, generational status, and more.

In light of this ongoing work, the theme for the 27th Annual UWSP Teaching Conference is "**Teaching for Social Justice**." Our goal is to highlight the social justice work being done on our campuses and

to foster meaningful conversations about the work that remains to be done. This theme also aligns directly with UW System-wide initiatives that emphasize social justice and equity-minded teaching and learning. Some guiding themes and questions to consider as you draft your proposals include:

SOCIAL JUSTICE IN THE CLASSROOM

How have you incorporated social justice into your course design? How have you engaged students in social justice work in your classes? How has your department worked to make social justice a part of your curriculum?

Access

How have you helped students to access the resources (housing, food, technology, healthcare, etc.) they need? How have you helped improve access to higher education? How have you reimagined courses and curricula to make them accessible to a wider variety of students?

EQUITY

How have you changed your classes to promote more equitable outcomes in your courses? In your programs? How have you used data or technology to identify and improve equity in your courses? In your programs? How have you fostered meaningful conversations about equity in your programs/ departments/schools/colleges?

New Questions

New questions are being built into the new platform from the onset and will be ready when the new platform launches.

Mid-Term Evals

Mid-term evaluations are the second phase of the project. We likely won't have the new platform and evaluations working in time to run mid-terms this semester. We won't address these until we have the main evaluations up and running correctly. We anticipate the addition of midterm evals an easier project; we'll be able to piggyback most of the project from the work we've done for the main semester evals.

End of Period Evaluation

We've missed evaluation for the 4w1 period and will likely miss evaluations for the 8w1 period.

We were on track to go live with the platform last week but discovered errors in the data export from AccessPoint to the evaluation platform. We can't go live until this is resolved. Once we have a working evaluation platform, we'll need to do some testing in limited courses to ensure everything is ready for the bulk of courses in December.
