Improving Test Scoring Services

Finals week is coming up and that means a huge jump in the number of scantron test packets scored through the CITL office. There are a few crucial points for faculty and staff to keep in mind when preparing a test scoring packet to guarantee prompt and accurate results. Please see the **Test Scoring Checklist** below to make certain your test packet meets all the requirements. When administering a test, it is good practice to remind students to use a No. 2 pencil to complete the scantron answer sheet and also to complete their name and student ID spaces and the corresponding bubbled areas. Incomplete bubbling of student names and ID numbers adds a ton of extra time to the processing of a test packet.

Test Scoring Checklist

Please check your tests carefully prior to bringing them to CITL. Each test packet must have:

- An Exam Scoring Request Form
- An intercampus envelope with your return information: Instructor name, department, and building
- Your completed answer key with no marks on the leading edge border (the short end to the left of the name field)
- Student answer sheets completed with No. 2 pencil, all facing the same direction and with student names and IDs completed and bubbled
- No blank scantron sheets included with the exams to be scored

Delivery Notes:

Test packets must be delivered in person to the CITL office at 403 Albertson Hall. The office hours are 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. There is an after-hours drop slot right outside the main office door.

Using D2L Course Templates

id you know there are 4, 8, and 16 week D2L templates available for you to import into your courses? The templates are designed for use in online courses, but can be useful for instructors teaching any course. The templates contain a ton of useful information and resources. All templates contain the same instructor resources including: instructions, templates, tips and suggestions, links to UWSP resources, pre-made weekly modules, a sample weekly module, and more. All templates also contain a "Begin Here" module for students, which provides links to useful campus resources. To access the templates, go to <u>http://www.uwsp.edu/online</u>, click Faculty Links, select Course Design Resources, and click the D2L Course Templates link. Once on the page, simply follow the instructions to import a template into your course.

Join Active Teaching Labs

Q eginning in the fall semester, the CITL will offer weekly Active Teaching Labs hosted by faculty and instructional staff who have used innovative strategies to solve teaching and learning issues in their classrooms. Lab participants then experiment with these strategies on their own devices during the lab, and then discuss with their colleagues how they can be applied to their own classrooms.
