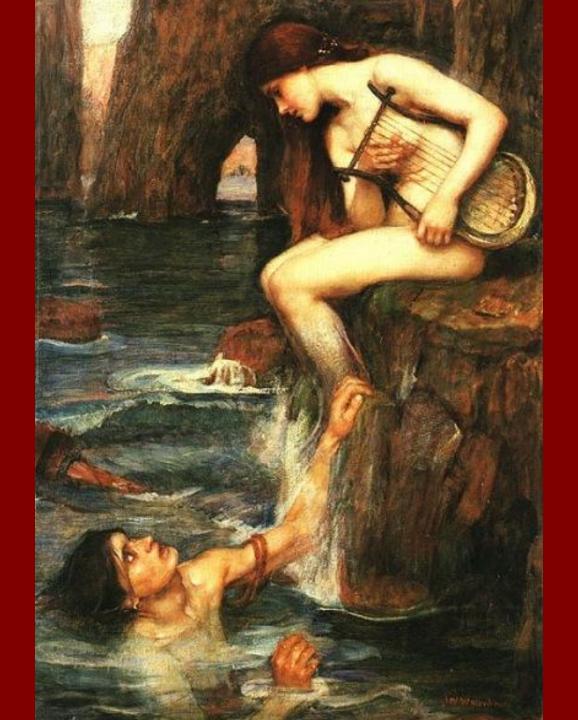
### Ethics, Lakes, and Love

The quality of cranes lies, I think, in this higher gamut, as yet beyond the reach of words.

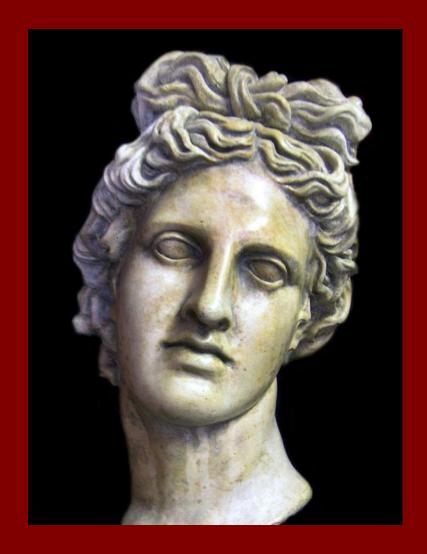




Lake Sagatagan, Collegeville MN

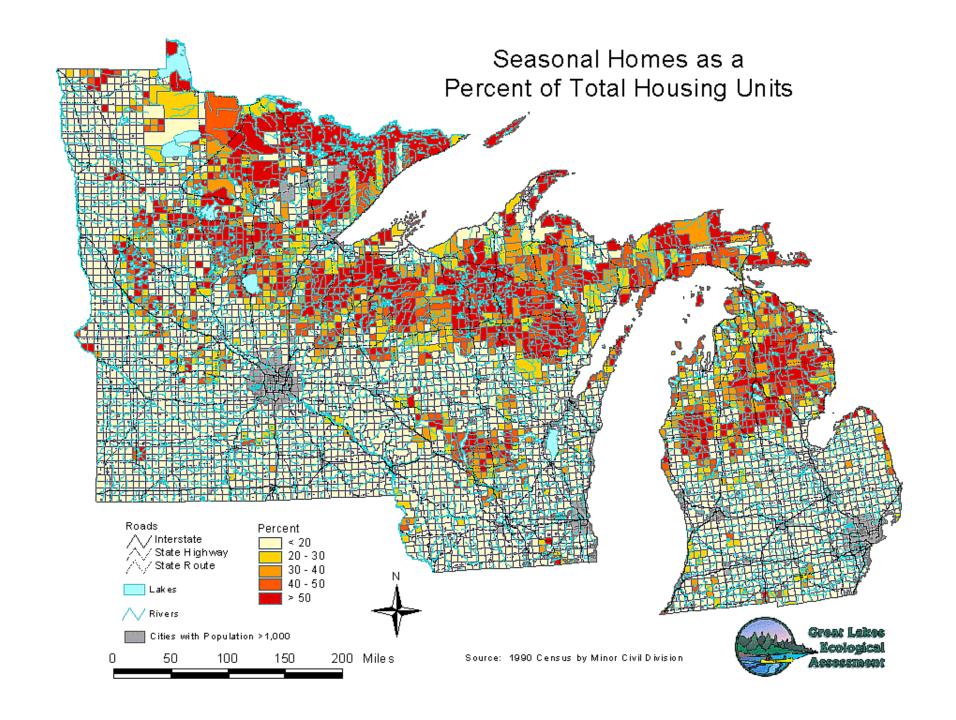

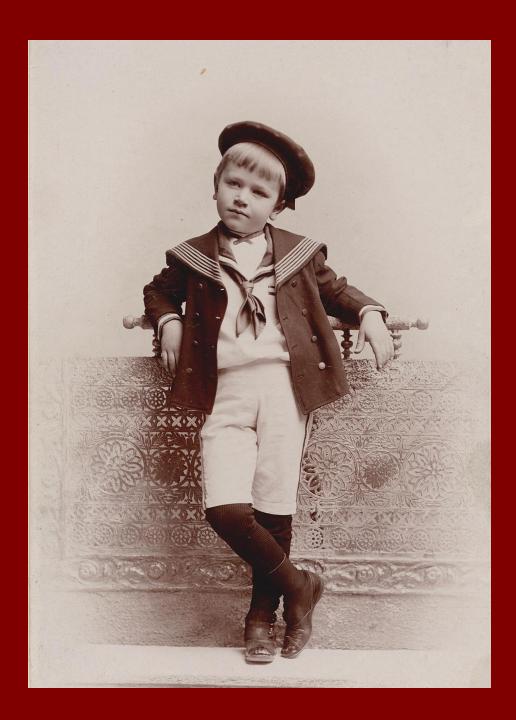

(January 11, 1887 – April 21, 1948) USFS Forest Ranger, NM and AZ, 1909-1924






Published "Game Management" in 1933, following a multi-state survey of wildlife conditions in the midwest.

# Aldo Leopold's Guide to Loving The Land...

- Keep all the pieces- don't permit native species to be extirpated or become extinct.
- Understand the "land circuit" and manage the flows of energy and sediment...use natural areas as a reference.
- Welcome the land into our communityextend to the land and the biota the ethical considerations we give to each other.

"The basic problem is to induce the private landowner to conserve on his own land and no conceivable millions or billions for public land purchase can alter that fact."


If the individual has a warm personal understanding of the land, he will perceive of his own accord that it is something more than a breadbasket. He will see land as a community of which he is only a member, albeit now the dominant one. He will see the beauty, as well as the utility, of the whole, and know that the two cannot be separated.
