In fact it is common to find these fish all summer in stagnant mid-forest pools in the northwest part of the Reserve

^{**} Yellow perch were the dominant fish species in Lake Joanis in the mid-1990s; however, now (2009-2011) they are not encountered at all in population surveys. It is possible that the species has been extirpated from Lake Joanis by natural forces.
