Tips:

- Train all staff (including non-clinical workers) on teamwork and mental health.
- Establish policies and procedures to proactively address behavioral challenges.
- Ensure effective communication between departments, shifts, consultants, etc.
- Invest in staff retention efforts.
- Hire nurses, nursing supervisors, aides with psychiatric experience.
- Create positive therapeutic recreation programming.
- **Immediately** refer new residents for mental health services and engage them in therapeutic recreation.
