Course Description

This is the second semester of first year Arabic. This course is designed to reinforce and build upon what was covered during the first semester. The 5Cs of Communication, Culture, Connections, Comparisons, and Communities are at the center of the course. The course will be taught using a communicative approach, meaning that our focus is on real-world situations in which you can use the language in meaningful ways. This is a four-credit primarily **online course** with a weekly discussion section. You are expected to spend at least 2 hours per day working on assigned activities.

Objectives

By the end of the semester you will be able to:

- Communicate and exchange information about familiar topics using phrases and simple sentences, sometimes supported by memorized language.
- Handle short social interactions in everyday situations by asking and answering simple questions.
- Present basic information on familiar topics using language you have practiced using phrases and simple sentences.
- Write short messages and notes on familiar topics related to everyday life.
- Understand words, phrases, and simple sentences related to everyday life.
- Express emotion, opinion, belief, doubt and
- Describe past and future activities orally and in writing.

- Speak Arabic with a pronunciation able to be understood with effort by a sympathetic native speaker.
- Recognize pieces of information when listening; and
- Understand familiar words, phrases, and sentences within short and simple texts related to everyday life.

Homework, preparation, participation and communication

Homework, preparation, participation and communication

Attendance, preparation, participation, and prompt communication with your instructor are crucial to your success in this class. An online class requires rigorous planning, organization, and steady, everyday participation in the assigned activities, so that you can learn constantly and avoid "cramming" for assignments. "Cramming" does not lead to good lasting results in any subject matter and even less so in a foreign language. Arabic Language needs to be practiced every day for you to achieve mastery of it. We will be using https://flipgrid.com for oral participation. Every week, I will assign an oral activity where you are required to record yourself in the target language answering the activity and comment on at least two of your classmate's recordings. Also, you will have assignments to complete almost every day in preparation for this course. Some of these may be self-graded, others may simply be marked complete or incomplete, and others will be graded and given feedback. You are expected to spend at least 2 hours per credit hour on homework and assigned activities, which must be submitted on Canvas (Look at the <u>Weekly Assignment Schedule</u>). In the event that no homework is assigned, you should spend that time reviewing material. Late homework will receive zero points.

Make-up Policy

- Make-up quizzes and tests are not given EXCEPT for sickness or official activities.
- It is your responsibility to notify me and arrange a make-up quiz/test in advance. In the case of illness/emergency, please contact me as soon as possible.

Writing Portfolio

Journal Entries: You will submit 5 entries, which are due every Monday beginning in Week 3 (submit to Canvas). All entries should be typed, using Times New Roman 14-point font, with 1-inch margins on all sides, with your name and the date in the top left corner. Late entry will receive zero points. Students are expected to incorporate into their journals new vocabulary and grammatical structures learned in the course. Specific topics and instructions are listed in the schedule of assignments. By the end of the course, students should be able to see the progress that they have made in their language ability.

Arabic Discussion

You are required to participate at one hour with the language facilitator each week. Arabic discussion is designed to practice Arabic with a native speaker which will improve your oral performance. You are expected to converse in Arabic only. Your language facilitator will report to me if you were there for a full hour and spoke only in Arabic while there.

Quizzes

Quizzes will be given every other week online. They will become available on Fridays at noon, and you must complete your quiz by the time and date indicated (Sundays at midnight). Quizzes will be opened only for two days. You may redo quizzes for a higher grade; your final attempt will be the grade that is counted, even if it is lower than an earlier attempt. If you find that a quiz that is supposed to

be available online is not, please email me immediately. Only those who do so will be allowed extra time to complete the quiz if necessary.

Quizzes are designed to allow you to assess yourself and for me to see where you may need help. It is up to you to use quizzes to your advantage by following the principles of academic integrity, completing them without help from books, dictionaries, or friends. Remember that when you take the oral tests and final written exam as you will not have any help, so use quizzes to help prepare yourself for the exams.

Oral Tests

You will have 2 oral tests during the semester. There will be NO MAKE-UP TESTS EXCEPT IN THE CASE OF A UNIVERSITY APPROVED EXCUSE.

Projects

Project 1: 10%

Step 1: Create a video speaking about yourself and your city. The video should include the following information: (4 to 5 minutes)

- Your name, age, job, phone number and home address.
- Things that you have and do not have.

Final Written Exam
