Course Description and Goals

Congratulations on your successful completion of three semesters of Modern Standard Arabic! In the previous semesters you have acquired many Arabic vocabulary items and developed reading, writing, listening, and conversational skills. You have internalized many grammatical constructions essential to understanding and communicating in Arabic, and you have learned a lot about Arabic culture. This semester, you will continue to develop the skills you have previously acquired and learn more about syntactical and morphological structures of Modern Standard Arabic. The overall goal of this semester is to increase your proficiency level and enable you to do more with the language. Successful completion of this course would provide you with the groundwork for rapidly advancing in the Arabic language and the tools for further study and research in a formal classroom setting or on your own.

Course Requirements

Preparation, Class Participation, and Class Etiquette: Each week, a detailed schedule for homework assignments of the coming week will be posted on D2L. I cannot emphasize enough that preparation is key to success in this course. Come to class having thoroughly covered the materials assigned for the day (this includes reading the textbook, watching) DVDs, and doing homework and/or other assignments). This will enable us to use class time more productively. You will be more capable of participating in class activities, posing questions, and making comments if you are prepared. It is estimated that the average student needs about eight to ten hours a week dedicated to studying Arabic. Your preparedness will show in the quality of your participation in class. Your participation will be evaluated on a weekly basis. Attendance, completion of homework assignments, and inclass participation constitutes 20% of your final grade. Please do make an effort to frequently speak in class. Do not be afraid to make mistakes. It will be through your mistakes and the mistakes of others that you will learn. The classroom will be a friendly environment. No one will be judged. Class etiquette is simple: respect other students and be courteous. Using cell phones is not allowed without prior permission and only in cases of emergency. Disruptive behavior will result in partial or complete loss of the attendance/participation part of your grade. One of the course's goals is to build a learning community. Many class activities will require students to work in pairs or in groups. Cooperate with your activity partner(s) and converse in Arabic as best as you can.

Attendance Policy: As you can see, this course relies heavily on participation. Attendance will be taken every meeting. You may miss up to 4 classes without penalty. You are required to cover the materials taught during your absence. Please submit any late homework assignments when you return. You will get partial credit for late assignments. Any absences beyond 4 hours (without the instructor's approval) will result in lowering your grade. Approvals will be granted on a case-by-case basis (military drills, illness, conference presentations, and family crises are examples of legitimate reasons to miss some classes. Please always discuss your absences with your instructor and get them approved so that your grade does not suffer. Excessive, unexcused absences may result in a failing grade. If your absence is planned, please notify me by e-mail before class. Habitual tardiness will also result in lowering your final grade.

Quizzes: Several quizzes will be assigned throughout the semester. They will be announced on your weekly schedule about a week ahead of time. You will only be allowed to make up missed quizzes with approval from the instructor. The average grade of your quizzes will constitute 30% of your final grade.

Midterm Exam: Will be held in <u>Week Eight</u> of instruction (exact date TBA later). It will constitute <u>25%</u> of your final grade. There is an oral component of this exam.

Final Exam: Will be held on the last week of instruction (details TBA later). It will constitute $\frac{25\%}{0}$ of your final grade. There will be an oral component in the final exam (details will be announced later).
