Studio Class: Introduction to a variety of ceramic materials, processes of forming, finishing and firing. Exploration and invention are parts of working as well as skill development and understanding ceramic traditions.

ART 261 Learning Outcomes:

- Students will demonstrate how basic art elements can be manipulated according to design principles to achieve visual composition and will apply them to effectively communicate an idea.
- 2. Students will demonstrate visual and verbal vocabulary as it relates to 3D art-making and design skills.
- 3. Students will analyze 3D visual images, utilizing various approaches to problem-solving and critical thinking skills.
- 4. Students will demonstrate the fundamental skills of craftsperson ship and safe use of tools.
- 5. Students will document work.

Demos/ Projects:

- Test Tiles (made by everyone)
- Joinery process / hand building
- Texture palette: slab surfaces
- Volume process
- The Wheel: throwing cups/handles / trimming
- Color / Glaze application
- Nested bowls
- Decorated slab bottle
- Drape Mold: cut and rejoined, with B&W underglazes
- Tube-made cylinders: cut and rejoined, basic geometry/invent!
- Historical Research and PowerPoint Presentation with partner
- Process Photos for all projects (see page 2 for details)
- Kiln loading and firing
- Group Critique

Schedule of projects and due dates will be handed out separately.

Process Photos: For each project, you are required to take at least 4 images showing the projects progression during creation. It is easiest to stop working and take a photo with your cell phone to be printed to accompany your project when the **project is due**. Please print process photos, 2 to a page in either B&W or color, putting them in a plastic 8 ½ x 11 sleeve to place in your binder. Label each page neatly. This allows a great record of your work to be shown in a professional manner. Also, these digital images will be created for your future use and as proof of project completion in case your work goes missing or due to a firing failing.

IMPORTANT: FOR YOUR BA/BFA REVIEWS: BINDER AND ALL PROJECTS MUST BE SAVED.

ATTENDANCE: YOU MUST ATTEND CLASS. Two (2) ABSENCES ARE ALLOWED. Being 10 minutes tardy (or leaving early prior to the end of class) is considered being tardy/leaving early. Being tardy/leaving early 2 times is considered the same as one absence. If you will be absent, please email me prior to class. Any doctor's excuses are to be given to Dr. Susie Rood and a copy given to me on the day you return. (see the last page "Student Information" for more details). Your Final Grade (earned for the assigned projects during the semester) is then lowered a grade for each additional absence after the allowed 2 missed days. Consideration is given for inclement weather and/or difficult travel situations (please communicate with me on the same day you are unable to attend class). Any demos missed will not be repeated. It is up to the student to learn from a classmate what they have missed, i.e. homework assignments, preparation for the next class (supplies needed, projects due, etc.).

Projects are to be complete on the due date. Besides the **project**, *process photos* for that project are also due. If you miss class on the date the project is due, you (or your representative) have until 4:00 pm to hand in the project, in full. Every day late is a grade lowered on your project.

It is YOUR RESPOSIBILITY to have work ready when it is due! You will be informed if a due date is changed. **Studio courses require outside time of class to work on projects.** It is up to you to communicate if you are having any class related difficulties.

GRADING: Emphasis is placed on your participation in class and projects completed on the dates due. Each project is evaluated by the student demonstrating they are following instructions, displaying craftsperson ship and exhibiting creativity. Participating in class discussions/critiques, firing kilns and completing your weekly studio jobs are taken into consideration as well.

Class cleanup: Scrape wedging table when you are finished. SPONGE YOUR WORK TABLE SURFACES. YOU **MUST NOT** LEAVE A MESS FOR YOUR CLASSMATES AND FACULTY. **THIS MUST BE DONE THOROUGHLY.**

Final studio clean-up at the end of the semester

DURING CLASS PERIOD: - No headphones are to be worn/used during class time.

Cellphones can be used to photograph the various stages of your work. I suggest you photograph each work prior to bisque firing, after glazing and after final firing.
