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CATALOG DESCRIPTION: COURSE OBJECTIVE:	Further study of photography as an expressive art form, explores photographic vision, development of personal style and identity in image- making. The student is strongly encouraged to develop a personal connection to the work and to further refine the technical aspects of black and white format. The emphasis of this course is the development of a personal fine arts

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:	There will be four critiques during the semester and a final critique during exam week. A take home final identifying important images from lecture will be due the at the final exam time. Students are expected to make two new contact sheets and turn in two new prints every week (Wednesdays at the beginning of class). All critique work must be finished and ready to show. Students are expected to verbalize on their work, and to establish a connection with issues and artist both past and contemporary. Students will develop an artist statement to be presented as a complement to their final portfolio. Students are expected to do research to support their exploration. A final portfolio of 10 pieces will be turned in the last day of classes for

evaluation during exam week. An exchange suite of n pieces will be required. The print exchange will occur at the final exam time.
