3. COURSE POLICIES

3.1. Attendance

- This class seeks to prepare you for the professional world of work. To this end, your attendance in class is required. Your regular attendance develops responsibility and accountability and sets a pattern that is expected by employers. Good communication is also an expectation of your professors, instructors, and future employers. You must communicate in a timely manner with your professors and instructors regarding any necessary absence, late arrival, or early departure from class.

- Unexcused late arrival to class (tardy) three times will be counted as one absence.
- Except for an emergency, you are expected to remain in the classroom for the duration of the class period. If you must leave class early, inform your instructor before class. If you fail to inform the instructor, your early departure will count as a Tardy.

There will be an online mid-term exam, and a final exam. The Final Financial Planning Project (building an Excel spreadsheet model financial plan) worth 20% of the final grade. There will be no surprise quizzes, projects, or exams.
