Course Objectives:

In Chinese 200, students will improve all four aspects of language acquisition: speaking and listening as well as reading and writing. They will consolidate and build on the skills they have acquired in Chinese 102. Students will be working with different partners and in small groups daily to facilitate as much conversation as possible. Grammar topics will also be systematically reviewed. By the end of the semester, each student should feel much more comfortable when hearing the Chinese language and should also be able to speak on a variety of topics and issues covered in this course.

Learning Outcomes:

In the 3rd semester, students will develop the following skills:

- become more conversant in Chinese,
- improve listening skills and the ability to comprehend the Chinese language,
- grasp the fundamental concepts of Chinese grammar covered in this course,
- improve their writing skills in the Chinese language,

- learn and understand Chinese culture.

Course Requirements:

- 1) In order to succeed in this course, regular attendance and active participation in classes are extremely important. In accordance with written Departmental policy, unexcused absences will be noted and three or more will cause a reduction in points on the final exam. In addition, assignments or quizzes missed due to an unexcused absence cannot be made up. Absence will be excused for <u>documented</u> medical and other emergencies. Participation accounts for 40% of the grade for this course. Active participation in the class will affect your final grade in a positive way; non-participation will affect your final grade in a negative way.
- 2) Preparation & Homework: All the preparation work for each class is completed by the students before class time. It is necessary to study and prepare the lesson assigned beforehand and to complete the homework assigned for that day. Other compositions and exercises assigned by the instructor are to be done independently outside of class in order to make the best use of group time during the class hours.
 - 3) <u>Tests and Exams</u>: There will be at least one quiz per chapter given to make sure students have understood and grasped new material in each chapter. There will be a mid-term oral test and a final comprehensive exam including oral and written exams.
