Course Information

This course builds on skills taught in previous classes such as CNMT 110 and CNMT 210 to provide analysis of and experience with the techniques and practices involved in creating applications within an organization. It is expected that you have taken (and passed) CNMT 110 and CNMT 210 prior to taking this course.

Learning Objectives:

- Demonstrate creation of applications within a team environment using software development methodologies such as Agile with Scrum.
- Apply knowledge from previous courses to create multi-level, object-oriented applications.
- Demonstrate understanding of core concepts of modern programming, including best practices for front-end and backend development.

Office Hours during COVID-19:

Office hours will be entirely virtual and by appointment. Availability will generally be during business hours between 8am and 5pm, Monday through Friday but there is some flexibility for students and the instructor to find a mutually acceptable time to meet outside of those hours.

Appointments should be made by contacting the instructor via email at the address noted above. Depending on the nature of the appointment, the meeting may occur via telephone, videoconference, or another mutually-agreeable form of communication.

Communication with the Instructor:

Under normal circumstances, students and instructor meet regularly and can discuss issues face-to-face. However, given the current situation that is not possible. Therefore, you should communicate with the instructor using email at the address noted above. In certain circumstances, a voicemail would also be appropriate. Email is the official means of communicating. You should not use messaging in Canvas or any other form of electronic messaging for communication with the instructor because these will not be checked on a regular basis, if at all.

Assignments, Due Dates, and Late Assignments:

There will be regular assignments and points-based exercises throughout the course. These assignments and exercises will be posted on Canvas and will have due dates associated with them. Meeting the due dates is your responsibility but if you are unable to meet a due date, you should discuss the issue with the instructor in order to determine what, if any, options are available.

An assignment is considered late if it is turned in after the due date. In certain cases, an assignment that is up to 48 hours late may be graded and a late penalty up to 50% may be assessed. Late assignments beyond 48 hours after the due date are not eligible for points or grading.

Though class will be delivered asynchronously, there will be points-based material given and due within the same week of class. Additionally, exams and quizzes will be timed and may have a smaller window or timeframe in which they can be taken.

In all cases, true emergencies do happen that can prevent you from completing your work on time. Please contact the instructor as soon as possible to discuss any available options.
