Students will be exposed to the history and contemporary practices of Video Art. Students will identify the principles, procedures and techniques of Video Art while analyzing and developing aesthetic judgments about form through lectures, readings, discussions, examinations, written assignments, video screenings and equipment demonstrations. Students will develop competence and creativity in various stages of video art production by producing an original work of Video Art and participating in classwide critiques.

Assignment Descriptions:

Watch: Students will watch assigned works of video art online.

Read: Students will complete assigned reading regarding history, theories, and artists related to video art.

Discussion: Students will respond to questions and ideas in an online discussion forum based on the weekly screenings and readings.

One-on-One Meeting(s): Students will discuss the project that they wish to create including concept, theory, and logistics.

Work in Progress Report: Students will send an online update of their project's progress. The instructor will give feedback.

Work in Progress Presentation: Students will present their work in progress during the lab time for class-wide feedback.

Final Critique: Students will present their completed video art project for class-wide critique.

Final Exam: Students will be examined on their knowledge of video art works. Students will identify assigned works of art by artist and title.

Demo: The instructor will demonstrate equipment and software during the Lab time.

Preproduction: This is a time for students to prepare all of the details before beginning production.

Production: Typically, cameras are rolling.

Postproduction: The final phase of production. This typically includes video and audio editing, among other things.

Assignment Policy: Late assignments will not be accepted.

Students are responsible for all course materials, including, but not limited to: class lectures, handouts, reading assignments, projects, labs, and quizzes. Assignments and

due dates may be changed at the instructor's discretion with fair notice to students. Please see the attached tentative course schedule for specific assignments and due dates.

Typically: Course materials for each Week will open up on Sunday at Midnight and weekly materials are due on Saturday at 11:59PM.
