## **Course Description**

This course examines gross anatomy and physiology of the respiratory, phonatory, and articulatory systems of the speech mechanism. In addition, the topics the central nervous system, hearing anatomy, and hearing physiology will be introduced and discussed.

## **Course Objectives:**

- 1. Each student will understand and explain the anatomy and physiology of the respiratory system and how this system relates to communication.
- 2. Each student will understand and explain the anatomy and physiology of the phonatory system and how this system relates to communication.
- 3. Each student will understand and explain the anatomy and physiology of the articulatory system and how this system relates to communication.
- 4. Each student will define information about hearing anatomy and how it relates to communication.
- 5. Each student will recall information about the nervous system as it relates to speech, language, and hearing.

## **Course Requirements**

1. **Exams**: There will be 3 scheduled exams throughout the semester, see class schedule. Each exam will be worth 20% of the final grade.
