Course Description and Purpose

The course seeks to foster your critical thinking and argumentation skills. Upon the completion of the course, you should be able to:

- Summarize fairly and accurately an argument regardless of your agreement/disagreement with the
 argument
- Locate the thesis as well as the stated and unstated premises of an argument
- Evaluate the strength of the evidence and the soundness of the reasoning supporting the thesis
- Locate sources and incorporate them into your own writing/argument while properly document all borrowing
- Develop your own thoughtful arguments
- Communicate your argument effectively for diverse audiences (Division of Communication Program Learning Outcomes)
- Recognize and describe ethical dilemmas pertaining to persuasive arguments (Division of Communication Program Learning Outcomes)

Attendance

Missed/Late Assignments

You are expected to present your argument on the class day when you are scheduled. If you miss your presentation, it will be impossible to make it up.

Written assignments must be handed in via D2L or at the end of the class as specified by the assignment. Late assignments receive a failing grade.

If you miss a quiz, an exam or an assignment, unless you are granted an excused absence, you will not be permitted to make it up.

Academic Honesty

When completing your assignments, you are expected to do original work. That is, you must avoid any form of plagiarism. I consider plagiarism - as defined by *Dictionary.com* – the "use or close imitation of the language and thoughts of another author and the representation of them as one's own original work." A student caught on plagiarizing shall receive a failing grade for his/her assignment.
