Course Description

This course shares the what, when, and how of integrating children's literature into Early Childhood content areas and home-school- community partnerships with a variety of learners. To share a book with a child is to share life, love and the joy of learning. That is why this course explores how the early childhood educator can infuse the richness of children's literature in the classroom. The course adopts a developmental and global perspective in exploring how children's literature builds and enriches both the teacher and learners' appreciation of different abilities, parenting,

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1) Students will understand and demonstrate how different genres of children's books (e.g. informational/concept books, traditional literature, poetry, fantasy, and realistic fiction) can be deliberately interpreted in the EC curricula through various activities such as: drama, painting, cooking, movement, and singing.
- 2) Students will support families' efforts in sharing children's literature by showing sensitivity to diversity, respecting the uniqueness of each family, and being willing to synthesize and translate his/her knowledge of resources.

KNOWLEDGE (KNOW)

- Participants will identify the genres and role of children's literature in the early childhood years.
- Participants will explain how children's literature is used to enrich preschool curricula in various content areas.
- Participants will understand how children's literature can be used to promote homeschool partnerships and enrich learning experiences for a variety of learners.

SKILLS (ABLE TO DO)

- Participants will be able to enrich their abilities to explore EC themes in EC classrooms based on their knowledge of the genres of children's literature.
- Participants will be able to demonstrate how to prepare and collate hands-on-thematic resources and materials through children's literature.
- Participants will be able to demonstrate how to inform and engage families in the use of children's literature at home, through local libraries, and other places to enrich learning.

DISPOSITION (VALUE/APPRECIATE)

- Participants will appreciate learning how use various genres of literature to promote curricula understanding at the EC level.
- Participants will value integrating and sharing thematic resources available in children's literature with colleagues, families, and others.
- Participants will appreciate how they are able to evaluate the richness of children's literature to facilitate and plan meaningful activities for young children.

Description of Course Assignments

Weekly Discussion Boards

80 pts. (10 pts./week)

Students will participate in weekly discussion boards as a way to converse with their peers as if they were face-to-face. Each student will be expected to post an initial (paragraph of more) post by Thursdays at midnight (worth 5 points). They are then expected to reply to a peer's initial post in a thoughtful, respectful, and meaningful manner by Sunday at midnight (worth 5 points). Week 8 discussion board will differ due to Spring break (see CANVAS for due dates). Rubric can be found on CANVAS for specifics.

Genres of Literature & Awards

40 pts.

Students will work in groups assigned by the instructor and use the chart provided to prepare information on their assigned genre and award-winning books. See chart and rubric on CANVAS for specifics.

Annotated Bibliography

100 pts.

Students will select a minimum of ten books based on an appropriate and pre-approved EC theme. Students will then prepare summarized lesson plans and ideas on how to use each book in an EC classroom.

Assignment Criteria/Late Work

Quality: Papers must demonstrate scholarship and higher-level thinking skills. Ideas must be clearly stated, using inclusive language. Statements must be supported by concrete examples and reliable references. Paragraphs must be logically organized and coherent with correct spelling and grammar. More than one grammatical/mechanical error per page (on average) does not constitute "A" work. Overall appearance must be polished and professional. Papers must be word-processed and double-spaced.

Originality: All work must be <u>original for this class</u>. Work done for other classes will not be accepted. Information that is not the student's original work must be documented by citing the source using APA 7th edition.

Submission Format: Unless otherwise noted, all assignments must be submitted **electronically** on CANVAS uploaded in student folder **on or before the due date by midnight**. Each assignment must be submitted as a single WORD document. The top page of each paper must have name, date, course number, and assignment name.

Timeliness/Late Work: One point or one letter grade will be deducted from the assignment grade for each day that work is submitted late. A failing grade, or an incomplete will be given for noncompletion.

UWSP 14.03 Academic misconduct subject to disciplinary action.

- (1) Academic misconduct is an act in which a student:
- (a) Seeks to claim credit for the work or efforts of another without authorization or citation;
- (b) Uses unauthorized materials or fabricated data in any academic exercise;
- (c) Forges or falsifies academic documents or records;
- (d) Intentionally impedes or damages the academic work of others;
- (e) Engages in conduct aimed at making false representation of a student's academic performance; or
- (f) Assists other students in any of these acts.
- (2) Examples of academic misconduct include, but are not limited to:
 - Cheating on an examination
 - Collaborating with others in work to be presented, contrary to the stated rules of the course
 - Submitting a paper or assignment as one's own work when a part or all of the paper or assignment is the work of another
 - Submitting a paper or assignment that contains ideas or research of others without appropriately identifying the sources of those ideas
 - Stealing examinations or course materials
 - Submitting, if contrary to the rules of a course, work previously presented in another course
 - Tampering with the laboratory experiment or computer program of another student
 - Knowingly and intentionally assisting another student in any of the above, including assistance in an arrangement whereby any work, classroom performance, examination or other activity is submitted or performed by a person other than the student under whose name the work is submitted or performed.

Students suspected of academic misconduct will be asked to meet with the instructor to discuss the concerns. If academic misconduct is evident, procedures for determining disciplinary sanctions will be followed as outlined in the <u>University System Administrative Code</u>, <u>Chapter 14</u>.
