Regional Economic Growth

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Prerequisites: Econ 111 – Principles of Microeconomics

Text: Modern Urban and Regional Economics, Philip McCann, Oxford (Second Edition).

Course Description: Factors that promote and/or hinder regional economic and business growth. Geographical distribution of resources and spatial ordering of industrial and commercial activities. Patterns of trade among regional and urban areas; regional business cycles. Patterns of land use and values in regions and urban areas.

Evaluation and Grades: Grades are determined by the total points earned on three equally weighted exams and an independent research project.

Exams (75% of final grade): Each exam will consist of two parts. Part one will consist of 24 multiple choice questions worth 2.5 points each (total 60). Part two will consist of four problem solving/short-answer questions worth 10 points each (total 40); exam total 100 points. There will be no make-up exams given after the exam has been given in class. If, due to a university sanctioned event or activity, you have a conflict with a scheduled exam you must notify me at least 7 days before the test is given. If you are seriously ill or a major emergency arises you must notify me in advance if at all possible. Any student who has not taken the exam with his/her section, or has failed to notify me in advance will be assigned a score of zero for that exam.

Research Project (25% of final grade): Each student will pursue an independent research project in the regional economics field (total 100). Part one will consist formulating a research question (total 25). Part two will consist collecting and analyzing the data (total 25). The third part will consist of writing a 5-10 page research paper (total 50). It is ecpected that you will work closely with me at each stage.
