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Course Description:

This is a graded 8-week course that will provide you with strategies and skills to study effectively. This is an activity-based course where attendance is crucial; I expect you will participate in all class activities. You're expected to think, reflect, write, and share your insights with your classmates. This course offers you the opportunity to think about how you learn best and then apply that knowledge to your study plan.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will have:

- A working knowledge of a variety of study techniques
- Applied study techniques to your own effective, academic plan

Course requirements (to pass this class):

- 1. Attendance and Participation: Engage yourself in the learning process. You will only get out of this class what you put in. You are allowed two absences. After two absences, every additional absence will cost you one-half a letter grade (from A to A-, from A- to B+, etc.). It is your responsibility to email me to get the homework or journal that was assigned during a class period you miss. You must complete all homework assignments, regardless of your attendance.
- 2. Assignments and Reflective Writing: I'll be asking you to reflect throughout the course. Reflecting is a fantastic way to investigate your own thinking. Reflections will be handed in via the Dropbox on D2L.
