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COURSE DESCRIPTION

Intensive analysis of literature, including poetry, drama and fiction, using representative types from several periods of literature.

Learning Objectives for this course

- 1. To develop an understanding of the nature of literary genres.
- 2. To develop an understanding of the elements of poetry, drama and fiction.
- 3. To develop an appreciation of literature and the ability to interpret it.
- 4. Read and discuss literature, including poetry, drama and fiction, selected primarily from various periods of English and American literature.
- 5. Write about literature (e.g., critical papers, essay exams, journals, impromptu responses).

Course Requirements

- 5. Students will write Midterm and Final exams.
