Course Description

From the catalog: "Read, select, and present materials suitable for elementary school readers." This class focuses on middle-grade fiction, material appropriate for children in 3rd-6th grades.

Course Goals:

- (Re)discover the pleasures of reading books for children
- Be familiar with the history of children's literature
- Know past and present authors of stories for children
- Explain the educational value of different genres in children's literature
- Recognize and analyze the use of literary elements in children's literature
- Evaluate children's stories on the quality of writing and the needs of students
- Be familiar with issues in selecting and teaching various categories of children's books
- Apply techniques for discussing literature and incorporating literature into the classroom.

Note Taking:

Textbook readings: When the semester is finished, you will return your rental textbook and no longer have access to its content. As such, I want you to take notes, so you will have that information later.

Literature Circles: You will participate in student-led book activities and take notes, so that you will have information about those activities accessible to you later, when you might need them. **Presentations:** To help you pay attention and be engaged in presentations, you will take notes.

Your note-taking grade is based on content (not good writing, neatness, etc.). I want to see that you have done the reading or paid attention in class and have taken down enough information for it to be useful to you later. For any given assignment, you will <u>upload your notes as a single file</u>. You can take photos of notebook pages and convert them to a single pdf (genius scan app, etc.) or you can import them into a word document. I encourage you to take notes by hand; you will remember material much better this way.

<u>Good Writing:</u> I expect you to write well. Many of you are going to be teachers, so you need to take special care that anything you write does not cause others to think poorly of you. If this is an area in which you struggle, I am happy to work with you. I also recommend scheduling regular meetings at the Tutoring and Learning Center (TLC) to improve your writing.

<u>Plagiarism:</u>

Plagiarized occurs when you use another's words or ideas without properly citing them. Every assignment will be submitted to plagiarism-checking software (the canvas dropbox). I will fail work that is plagiarized and report offenders to the dean's office.

<u>Late work</u>. Turn in materials on time. Canvas gives you a due date, and I usually leave the assignment open for a few days past that date. If an assignment you have completed cannot be submitted, let me know. I sometimes accept late work but realize that if you turn in work late over and over, the end of the semester will catch up with you.
