Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to provide you with a deeper appreciation and understanding of the literary and cinematic arts by teaching you to uncover the richness of verbal and visual compositions. You will learn to analyze great works of literature and film as we read and watch four masterpieces: *Sense and Sensibility* Jane Austen/Ang Lee), *The Talented Mr. Ripley* (Patricia Highsmith/Anthony Minghella), *A Clockwork Orange* (Anthony Burgess/Stanley Kubrick), and *No Country for Old Men* (Cormac McCarthy/Joel & Ethan Coen). In the process, we will explore such themes as madness, music, violence, propaganda, art, freedom, racism, intolerance, government oppression, conformity, sexuality, class conflict, greed and American values. We live in a culture that constantly bombards us with words and images, so in addition to learning how authors and filmmakers use language and imagery to communicate ideas and create meaning, you will also learn to pay attention to the ways in which words and images can be used to manipulate you into seeing the world a certain way.

For the most part, class will be run as a large informal discussion that will allow you to work through your ideas, bring up any questions you have, and exchange opinions with your classmates in a way that will broaden your perspective on the novels and films we discuss. I will lecture occasionally to provide you with necessary background information, but my role will be that of a facilitator who guides class discussion. Therefore, this class is what you make of it, and its success depends largely on your willingness to participate and make it your own. You will have to keep up with the reading, take notes on the films we watch, and show up to class with something to say. If you do, you will find this class to be both enjoyable and rewarding.

The course fulfills the AAS depth requirement (after you have taken English 200: Introduction to Literature) and the BA/BS fine arts requirement.

Essays:

Over the course of the semester you will produce three essays. Each essay must: 1) Make an original, contestable, specific, and persuasive argument about a literary and/or cinematic work from the course, 2) Gradually develop your reader's understanding of the text, 3) Display

polished and elegant prose, 4) Follow rules of grammar, syntax, and citation, and 5) Be free of typos. You will have the option to rewrite either the Close Reading or Scene Analysis Essay.
