

Crossroad between three continents, North Africa has complex identities, with three major often conflicting dimensions: African, Mediterranean and Middle-Eastern. This course will introduce students to the history of this *Maghreb* starting with native North Africans, Arab colonization of the 8<sup>th</sup> century, Berber resistance, Moors, Turks of the Ottoman Empire and French invasion of 1830. We will study concepts of French colonialism and its "*mission civilisatrice*", the rise of nationalist movements, and the process of decolonization during the French-Algerian war of 1962-1954. Finally, we will examine recent experiences of democracy, radical Islamists, the civil war in Algeria of the 90s, and the tragedy of secular intellectuals and women.
