Culture Clash: France-Francophone-US Experience

For Lang 381 is NOT a traditional French Film course but rather a **Cultural Studies** course that deals with **Culture Clash**. We will study **12 modern French films** made by European directors between the sixties and today, each of them presenting *real situations* where *cultural conflicts* **occur**. Fictional and documentary films are used as documents and provide a "<u>first-hand</u> <u>experience</u>" about controversial issues in language and culture, identity, immigration/immigrants and otherness.

We will examine why do the French / Francophone and Europeans seem so cultured, savvy, passionate yet odd, strange, even *weird* to Americans? **Why** do they seem rude, "immoral" and have sometimes been called *anti-American*? **How** do they "*think*", behave and express their thoughts?

This course is designed to prepare students for <u>France, Europe and the Francophone-</u><u>Mediterranean world</u> before traveling as a student, scholar, on business or simply as a tourist. By defining and examining the <u>habitus</u> of the French / Francophone, and of Europeans, and comparing it with Americans, through concepts of the family, educational system, conversation and friendships, relationships and business, we learn to improve communication in the real world (**highly recommended** for students in World Languages, International Studies, ESL, History, Poli Sci, Business, and Peace Corps volunteers).
