FN 373 Nutrition Through the Life Span – 100% Online Spring 2023

<u>Course Description</u>: Nutritional requirements, challenges, community nutrition programs and eating patterns throughout the life span. (3 credits) Prerequisites: FN 206 and 354 (formerly 253)
