GOALS: To develop <u>an active use of French</u> and to build on knowledge acquired in previous classes through

- **Listening** (face-to-face conversations, videos, CDs)
- **Speaking** (conversations, oral presentations, short discussions, etc.)

- **Writing** (clear expression of familiar and abstract topics with control of verb tenses and other grammatical constructions)
- **Culture** (learning to understand cultural differences and similarities)

4. Comparisons

4a. recognize that learning a foreign language does not simply involve a one to one translation from one's first language.

4b. recognize that learning a foreign language involves utilizing multiple communication skills in order to address common and specific needs.

4c. demonstrate an understanding of the concept of culture through comparisons of the target culture(s) and their own.

5. Communities

5a. use the target language with an appreciation of the target culture beyond the classroom setting.

5b. appreciate the complexities of intercultural and interpersonal communication between and within languages.

5c. empathize with target language communities that exist within and outside of areas where the target language is of the majority.
