Course Description: This course explores the theatre and dramatic traditions of Western Civilization. Refer to plays as DRAMA, once they are put on stage, we use the term THEATRE. Careful reading of the assigned material before class will enable you to understand drama in relation to various aspects of theatre including relevant historical/social context, evolving theatre architecture and practices. By semester's end, you should be able to "appreciate theatre" with knowledge to enrich the experience as audience member; and you may also be inspired to pursue new interests in future study and application.

Specific Learning Outcomes

- Gain an understanding of major developments in theatre: Ancient Greece, Elizabethan, Dramatic and Theatrical Realism, and various departures to such tradition in the form of poetic realism, issue based theatre, and expanding definitions of theatre to include performance.
- Demonstrate the ability to think critically about live performance, putting into writing detailed observations about the production and how they (or fail to) deliver a cohesive piece of theatre.
- Understand the various aspects involved in production including acting, directing, design, and marketing

All courses in the humanities ask that you approach the subject matter with maturity and a healthy respect for other cultures and belief systems. Some of the plays we read have strong language and explore issues related to sexuality, social norms, value.

Attendance Policy and Class Decorum: A good deal the course material will be in the form of lecture. By the second week of class, we will establish a seating chart. This chart will enable students to work with the same individuals when we do interactive work in class; and make it easier for me to track your attendance. Students who disrupt class will be asked to leave and not given credit for daily participation activity—whether it is during that particular class *or* for the most recent activity. Habitual disruption will result in appropriate disciplinary action and lowered or failing grade.

Extra Credit: Seeing additional plays will be worth up to 10 extra credit points; there will be optional questions about these plays on Exams 3 or 4.
