Learning Objectives:

Upon completing this course, you should be able to:

- successfully play and trust yourself and others "in space".
- deepen and explore acting style and analysis.
- explore various acting techniques using Stanislavski based methods.
- perform monologue and scene work utilizing methods & skills gained during the semester.

Coursework:

Each student will perform a **monologue** and **two scenes (or 1 scene + exercises)** for the class. Additional class work will vary depending on both the size and progress of the class. Students should understand a significant amount of time will be needed outside of class for rehearsal of acting material used throughout the course.

Artist Notebook

Each student will keep a **confidential** (shared only with instructor) Artist Notebook to be turned in at any point at the instructor's request. You must bring your notebook to every class. Artistic Notebooks must be designed/decorated on the front cover before the second week of classes *begins* and designed/decorated on the back cover by December 1. Failure to provide notebook upon request will result in loss of 50 Total final points towards your final

grade for each occurrence (as well as a zero for any assignment connected to the journal that is missing at the due date).

Notebooks should be divided clearly (and labeled) into four sections. These sections include:

- 1. <u>Classroom</u>. This should include notes from lectures and discussion that occurs afterward, information about assignments, due dates, and notes from your reading of assigned pages. This section should also include notes/thoughts about the work of your classmates, as well as reflections upon your own performances. YOU SHOULD HAVE A REFLECTION FOR EVERY PERFORMANCE OF YOUR CLASSMATES AND YOUR OWN WORK.
- **2.** Rehearsal Log. This should include the following for every rehearsal you have ALL semester long:
 - i. How long did you rehearse, and where?
 - ii. A clear stated goal for your rehearsal.
 - iii. Was the goal achieved? Yes or no, and WHY?
 - iv. What do you need to do before your next rehearsal?
- **3.** Artistic Prompts. I will ask you a question each day of class. Please write the question and answer it before the next class session.
- 4. <u>Inspiration & Reflection</u>. This is your "golden box." This might include quotes, clippings, drawings, any material (visual or written) related or unrelated to your current work or research that you wish to save for future reference. This is not a diary. It's an *artistic journal*. Ideas you might include (this is just to get you thinking this can be anything you want it to be!):
 - **a.** Conversations about theatre/art/life that you have with others.
 - **b.** Information about new shows that are opening. Reviews. Reflections on the work you see at the university production season, and work you see outside the university.
 - c. Images. What do you see that inspires you that you might create yourself, or see somewhere that capture you? Perhaps an image from the internet, magazine or news article. Or maybe it's a watercolor or drawing that you make for yourself.
 - **d.** Stream of consciousness writing covering anything you wish that is going on in your life.
 - **e.** Reflections on your ongoing process of acting.
 - **f.** Challenges, achievements and goals.
 - g. Happenings in the theatre world.
 - h. Reflections/reactions about what is happening in the world.
 - i. Questions you want to ask me.
 - j. Ongoing goals.
 - k. Thoughts about how to be a productive member of the community you live within.

Recording your observations and ideas on a regular basis is a good habit to develop. You will find that if you imagine that you are writing for yourself, and not to meet a class requirement, this section of the notebook will be very useful to you. You must show a consistent commitment to this section (Section #4) of the journal and you should plan to have a minimum of three entries per week.

There will be specific assignments given in class that must be included in the notebook, and there should be an entry for each class session — even if you miss class, you are responsible for getting the notes and including those in your notebook. To get full credit for the notebook, you must have each class dated as well as numbered for clear identification within the first section of the Artistic Journal. (Ex. 9.18.17 Class # 3) I should be able to go through your notebook and clearly see each class entry. Each new class should start on the top of a new page.

Your notebook will be used as a reference for you and the instructor and will be graded based on depth and scope of the work within the four sections. For each class not outlined or assignment not completed in notebook, 25 points will be taken off your Total final points.

Grading Criteria:

The evaluation of this course will be given through the traditional "A" through "F" grading system. It is also important to realize that grades are derived from objective evaluation and should not be perceived solely as negative feedback. The following is an index of the criteria for each letter grade:

- A (90-100%) The student demonstrated an intellectual understanding of the material covered and incorporated the intellectual work into his/her performance. The student attended and actively participated in class and completed the assignments within the given time frame. The student was consistently prepared for class and showed strong improvement throughout the semester.
- B~(80-89%) The student understood and completed the assignments but was unable to rectify some of the smaller problems. The student completed the assignments well, exceeding the minimum requirements. The student was present during class and actively participated. The grade of "B" is very good: above average improvement.
- C (70 79%) The student attended and participated in class, followed through on feedback, and tried to finish requirements. Student improved enough to fulfill the minimum requirements. The grade of "C" is average.
- D (60-69%) The student attempted to complete the assignments but was unable to achieve some of the requirements. The "D" grade reflects the minimal amount of effort/improvement to receive a passing grade.
- F (below 60%) The student did not attend all the class periods, nor did he/she adhere to the assignment guidelines. The student did not adequately participate in class. No improvement was seen.

Class Policies:

- Attendance at all Faculty directed Theatre & Dance productions is mandatory.
- Department Costume and Property Collection Use: A student may not borrow a Department prop, weapon or costume unless it is integral to their classwork and not readily available (for example: a weapon or corset could be borrowed, a coffee cup could not). The instructor of the course must first approve the object to be borrowed and then the student must send an email to Cece Hill for a costume piece, Sarah Ross for a prop or Jared Hanlin for any weapon. The instructor must be copied on the email.
- Everything handed in must be **typed**, (unless otherwise stated) **stapled** if more than one page, **3-hole punched** and **with your name on it**. Failure to do so, will be **loss** of 25% of your grade for the assignment.
- Absolutely no flip-flops or high heels (unless using specifically in scene work.)
- Class requires regular attendance and participation. After two absences, whether excused or unexcused, your grade will be dropped one letter grade per absence.
 - O Attending class will likely be the single most important factor in determining your performance and grade in the course, so plan to attend every class. In most class meetings you will have at least one project, exercise, test, and/or discussion that will impact your grade, and your class discussions will count toward participation. The relationship between attendance and achievement in education has been extensively documented in peer-reviewed research. *I*

am not able to re-teach the material to you if you are absent, but you can ask a classmate to share notes.

- Attendance on performance days: Failure to deliver your performance on the assigned day results in a zero for that performance assignment. In addition, you must be on time the day you present your performance. If not, you will not present your performance. There will be no make-up performances except under emergency situations and at the discretion of the instructor. If you are performing in a scene and your partner(s) does not attend the performance day, the instructor will make arrangements ONLY FOR THE MEMBER(S) OF THE GROUP WHO WERE PRESENT AT THE ORIGINALLY DESIGNATED PERFORMANCE TIME.
- Be on time for class (Two late arrivals equal one absence).
- No late assignments are accepted. Failure to hand in an assignment at the beginning of class on the due date will result in a zero for that assignment. Only exceptions to this are emergency situations at the discretion of the instructor.
- Dress appropriately for your class/performance you may get dirty you will get sweaty.
- All performances must be memorized, unless otherwise noted.
- You will lose 25 points from your Total grade points if your cell phone disrupts the class. No cellphones should be used or visible during this class.
 - O Cell phone usage: Research supports that having visual access to a cell phone diminishes our ability to learn. Checking social media, texts, emails, and messages is unprofessional and disrespectful to our class community. Thank you for following these guidelines as they help create a positive learning community.
- Active listening and participation are required.
- You are responsible for the information sent to you in your UWSP e-mail. Please check your UWSP e-mail daily for class updates.
- Students are responsible for all relevant policies according to the University Catalog and the UWSP Student Handbook.
- All students are expected to prepare for class by completing all the necessary readings for class and being prepared for all class assignments. If you are not prepared, you will be asked to leave class.
- You must have the full script for any monologue and/or scene assignments/performances you work with in class. All assignments should come from a published, full length work of theatre. No internet only plays, monologues, etc.
- Do your own work. Plagiarism, with print or Internet sources (using another person's ideas or expressions in your writings or speeches without acknowledging the source) carries severe penalties, ranging from a zero for the assignment to failure of the course and probation/dismissal. Please see UWSP guidelines and academic misconduct policies for further information.
- In the event of a medical emergency call 9-1-1 or use Red Emergency Phone at the bottom of the entrance steps to Jenkins theatre, closest to NFAC 283. Offer assistance if trained and willing to do so. Guide emergency responders to victim.

- In the event of a tornado warning, proceed to Men's or Women's bathrooms near NFAC 283, NFAC 285 or NFAC 290. See www.uwsp.edu/rmgt/Pages/em/procedures/other/floor-plans.aspx for floor plans showing severe weather shelters on campus. Avoid wide-span structures (gyms, pools or large classrooms).
