DESCRIPTION

This course provides an introduction to the essential concepts and principles of *psychology*— the systematic study of thoughts, feelings, and behavior. The course begins with an overview of the science and profession of psychology. It then considers a range of key topics in psychology, such as neuroscience, memory, motivation, development, personality, and social behavior. The course concludes with a look at psychology as applied to health and wellness.

OBJECTIVES

Upon completing this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Explain or apply major concepts, theories, or methods used in psychological science to investigate, analyze, or predict human behavior.
- 2. Examine and explain how social, cultural, or political institutions influence individuals or groups.

Notes. In Focus Weeks, Mondays are typically used for review. This calendar is preliminary and subject to revision. Any changes will be announced in class, on Canvas, and/or via email.

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REQUIREMENTS

Classroom Exams. There will be 4 exams in this course. Each exam will provide 75 minutes to complete 50 multiple-choice questions over 4 modules. Each exam is worth 100 points (2 points per question) for a total of 400 points (100 points x 4 exams) or 40% of your final grade.

Discussion Forums. There will be 12 discussion forums in this course. In each forum, you will post two questions about a weekly module's materials. Excellent questions will clearly draw on module materials, will be distinct from the questions already posted, and will not be obvious to anyone who reviewed the materials. Only your 10 best forums will count toward your final grade. Discussion forums will be worth a total of 100 points (10 points x 10 forums) or 10% of your final grade.

Discussion Participation. You will be required to participate in class discussion. Participation will be evaluated 12 times across the semester, roughly once per week, by different students. Evaluations will be based on student-chosen criteria and will be periodically posted on Canvas to provide feedback on your participation. Unreasonable evaluations are subject to professor veto. Only your best 10 evaluations will count toward your final grade. Discussion participation will be worth 200 points (20 points x 10 evaluations) or 20% of your final grade.

Discussion Facilitation. Small groups of students (2-3) will be required to facilitate one day of classroom discussion on a textbook chapter during the semester. Successful facilitators will ask focused questions and allow others time to think (as much as 30 seconds), facilitate discussion between students (rather than dominating it or giving a presentation), and bring discussion back into focus when it goes off track (such as by using a thread in the discussion to return to point). Facilitators will be required to develop a plan and seek feedback from the professor in advance. Discussion facilitation is worth a total of 100 points or 10% of your final grade.

Research Paper. There will be a paper assignment in this course. Individual students will be required to write a roughly 4-5 page paper that focuses on designing two psychological studies. Papers will be submitted to the Canvas dropbox. The research paper will be worth a total of 200 points (rough draft = 100 points, final draft = 100 points) or 20% of your final grade.

Research Requirement. The research requirement provides you with an in-depth experience with research conducted in the Psychology Department. This requirement involves participating in 2 hours (or 2 credits) of psychological studies or completing library research. It does not earn points toward your grade—it is simply a requirement that must be fulfilled to receive your grade.

POLICIES

Attendance. The professor will not take formal attendance. Nonetheless, consistent attendance is important for performing well in the course. Course discussions will help to clarify the material and your participation will be periodically graded by other students. If you cannot attend class, it would be advisable to let the professor know as soon as possible. Documentation is welcome.

Communication. Please contact the professor with your questions or concerns related to this course, as well as other academic and career-related issues. Office hours are the most reliable means of contact. Three in-person office hours will be held per week. If you cannot attend these hours, schedule an appointment (in-person or via Zoom). Email is the next most reliable means of contact. Emails are typically answered within two business days (not evenings or weekends). If emails will require considerable discussion, they may be referred to office hours. Other means of contact (voicemails, dropping by my office, etc.) are generally unreliable.

Illegalities. Makeups. Requests for makeups must be accompanied by documentation. In most cases, makeups must be completed within one week of the original deadline to avoid receiving a zero for the assignment.
