Course Textbook:

Course Description:

German 102 is designed to build your comprehension and communicative skills in the language, to familiarize you with central cultural issues, and to continue your introduction to German language structure -- grammar and syntax. The primary text you will be using is *Vorsprung* Your course package consists in a textbook and a series of instructional videos on D2L which encourage you to work with the language in a variety of media and forms that complement each other.

Vorsprung is functionally and communicatively oriented: this means that language is never presented as a series of discrete items, such as vocabulary words or abstract grammatical rules, but rather as units of meaning.

We expect that by the end of a one year language program students will have gained a fundamental level of competence in “the five C’s”: communication, culture, connecting, comparison and community. This means:

- 1. Communication**
- 1a.** provide and obtain information, present concepts, and ideas in the target language to an audience of listeners or readers.
 - 1b.** comprehend and interpret written and spoken target language on a variety of topics.
 - 1c.** engage in conversations or correspondence in the target language to provide and obtain information, express feelings and emotions, and exchange opinions.
- 2. Cultures**
- 2a.** demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between the practices and perspectives of the culture(s) studied.
 - 2b.** demonstrate an understanding of the relationship

between the practices and and perspectives of the culture(s) studied.

3. Connections

3a. demonstrate that they can reinforce and further their knowledge of other disciplines through their knowledge of the target language and culture.

3b. demonstrate their ability to acquire information and recognize the distinctive viewpoints that are only available through the foreign language and its culture(s).

4. Comparisons

4a. demonstrate an understanding of the nature of language through comparisons of the target language studied and their own.

4b. demonstrate an understanding of the concept of culture through comparisons of the target culture(s) and their own.

5. Communities

5a. use the target language and culture both within and beyond the classroom setting.

5b. show evidence of becoming lifelong learners by using the target language for personal enjoyment and enrichment.

Enduring Understandings for first year students of German:

Students who have completed German 102 will understand that...

- German, like any language, is a social medium that provides access to new information and perspectives.
- The negotiation of a second-language situation involves the creation of meaning in this social medium.
- Learning German does not merely involve one-to-one translation, but rather the development of a set of skills for the purpose of communicating about common and specific needs and ideas.

Essential Questions:

- What skills and knowledge can be used to negotiate a second-language communication situations successfully?
- How does knowledge of a second language increase the understanding of our first language?

Knowledge:

Students will be able to...

- Identify and describe the basic geographic and cultural space of the target culture.
- Identify and discuss household items, near relatives, time-vocabulary, daily activities and basic means of transportation.
- Demonstrate basic understanding of syntax, including subject-verb agreement and the system of cases.

Skills:

Students will be able to...

- Give greetings and introduce him/herself in the target language.
- Demonstrate ability to formulate basic sentences and questions in the present tense.

Dispositions...

Students will be able to...

- Appreciate the complexities of intercultural and interpersonal communication between and within languages.
- Demonstrate awareness of the validity and complexity of other cultures.

Preparation and Participation:

Central to your success in German 102 will be regular attendance, preparation and participation. I will receive email reports demonstrating that you have (or have not) watched the videos and engaged with the quiz. It is important for you to be present and prepared every class day, and that you actively participate in class. Your participation guarantees that you will receive participation credit, and more importantly, improves your language learning. Make-up work will only be allowed in cases of illness, family emergency, or religious holidays. If you cannot inform me of your absence in advance you should approach me as soon as you return to class after your absence in order to be eligible for make-up work. You may be asked to provide proof of your reason of absence.

Quizzes, Tests and the Final Exam:

The quizzes, tests and the final exam will each assess listening, reading, writing, vocabulary, and grammar. Quizzes are brief checks of your knowledge of a particular topic. The test formats will include multiple choice, matching, and open-ended questions. The final exam is similar to the tests earlier in the semester but it is cumulative and somewhat longer. On test days you may

prepare a 3x5 card with notes on the front or back. Only German is permitted on this card.

Tests are worth 5 points each for a total of 25 points. They are graded on a 100 point scale. The 100 point scale translates into course points in the following manner:
