COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

German 201/211 continues the development of the four language skills (speaking, listening, reading, and writing) in a highly authentic cultural context. The course will enable you to better communicate in German about everyday topics, historical events, and cultural as well as literary themes. You will expand your comprehension of authentic German language texts from a variety of media and enhance your knowledge of cultural issues.

By the end of GER 201/211, students will be able to:

- 1. effectively communicate on a variety of topics of a personal nature using written language skills (reading and writing) to achieve at least a Novice High level on the ACTFL proficiency scale.
- 2. effectively communicate on a variety of topics of a personal nature using oral language skills (speaking and listening) to achieve at least a Novice High level on the ACTFL proficiency scale.
- 3. demonstrate knowledge of cultural practices, products, and perspectives encountered in a variety of spoken, written, and visual forms.

(For UWL students: German 201 fulfills the Mathematical/Logical Systems and Modern Languages General Education requirement.)

THIS SECTION OF GERMAN 201/211 IS A HYBRID COURSE. You will meet 75% of the time face-to-face in a physical classroom on your campus or virtually for live class sessions through Zoom. This allows students from all three campuses to interact with each other more directly. The other 25% of the time, you will work online at your own pace as you engage with the course content and materials. (This means 3 live hours + 1 self-paced hour online for a total of 4 class hours each week.)

REQUIRED TEXT

(German 101 covered units 1-4. German 102 covered unit 5-8. German 201/211 will complete units 9-12.)

THREE ADDITIONAL RESOURCES

Occasionally you will be asked to use a dictionary in German 201/211. You can rely on online bilingual dictionaries such as dict.leo.org or purchase a portable bilingual dictionary.

For a little extra grammar help, I recommend purchasing *English Grammar for Students of German*. Olivia & Hill Press, 2009.

Students are also highly encouraged to acquire and regularly use a three-ring binder to organize and collect grammar assignments, culture/vocabulary lists, and notes from class.

CANVAS

The syllabus, grammar practice answer keys, and asynchronous content for this course are accessible through Canvas. Every student enrolled in German 201/211 is required to use the course webpage on a regular basis.

You should check your university e-mail at least once a day. I may occasionally need to contact you regarding changes to the syllabus, preparatory class work, and/or reading assignments.

ATTENDANCE

Class meets three times a week either in person (Monday and Wednesdays) or through live virtual sessions (Fridays). There is also one additional asynchronous online hour assigned each week. If you have a good reason for not attending one of the face-to-face/virtual class hours such as illness or a family emergency, please let me know ahead of time, if possible. It is best to send me an email (shay@uwlax.edu). Students who miss class should meet with me during office hours or contact a fellow student enrolled in the course to obtain and discuss course material covered on that day. On occasion, you may not have time to thoroughly prepare for class. Please come to class and let me know this at the beginning of the hour. It is better to be in class and listen to the discussion than not to come at all. (You must also complete the week's asynchronous hours online by the dates listed in the syllabus as preparation for the following in-person class meetings.)

Students get three unexcused absences in GER 201/211. For every <u>unexcused</u> absence after the first three, your final grade may be lowered by one grade step.

(For example: Your final grade would be a B but you have 4 unexcused absences, so you receive a BC or B- instead.)

That being said, please carefully read the Covid-19 health statement below.

COVID-19 HEALTH STATEMENT

All UWL students are encouraged to be vaccinated/boosted against COVID-19. Campus-wide mask policy will be communicated centrally by UWL leadership, and the guidance may change during the term. Students who are ill or engaging in quarantine/isolation due to COVID-19 at the direction of a health professional should not attend class and should be in direct communication with each of their instructors regarding coursework. Instructors have an obligation to make sure students have access to course materials associated with missed days due to COVID-19. UWRF and UWSP students should follow the guidelines on their respective campuses.

<u>COVID-19</u> and <u>your instructor</u>: Should I become ill or exposed to the virus and need to self-quarantine, we will move the course to a fully online and synchronous format for as long as I am able. If I am unable to meet during our synchronous meetings, class hours will be fully online and asynchronous until I am able to meet with you again. I will communicate with you via email and Canvas announcements regarding any changes in format during the semester.

CLASS PREPARATORY ASSIGNMENTS

Learning a language works a bit differently than learning content or skills in other disciplines. It occurs most naturally and effectively when students engage with new material in advance of a class hour, and then use the class meeting to practice using new vocabulary or grammar or to ask targeted questions about points they found confusing. For this reason, we do not assign traditional "homework" in GER 201/211. Instead, students prepare for each in-person meeting by completing a variety of activities **before** coming to class. These activities are "graded" complete/incomplete largely based on effort rather than accuracy.

You will be responsible for all material included in the syllabus as well as any additional assignments given by your instructor during the course of the semester. Be prepared to put in **at least one hour** of preparation outside of class for every hour spent in class (this includes your online class hours). Since the grammar assignments offer clear explanations, grammar will regularly be treated in summary fashion in class. Completing the assigned textbook, vocabulary, and grammar preparatory work prior to every face-to-face or online class hour is essential as it will increase your comprehension of the material and leave us more time to practice speaking German when we meet in person.

You are responsible for up to three different kinds of preparatory work on a **daily basis**. They include:

- 1) Grammar activities (distributed as a course packet, completed by hand, "self-checked," and submitted electronically in Canvas)
 - day of each subunit. Grammar activities must be self-corrected in a contrasting ink color using the answer keys provided on the course Canvas site. A pdf or jpeg image of the assignments should be uploaded to Canvas by midnight the night before the material is covered in class and officially due. (This Canvas submission deadline was selected based on student feedback from previous semesters.) Failure to complete or self-correct this assigned work will lower your course grade.
- 2) Online activities (submitted electronically)
 - Auf Geht's comes with an online interactive component. In an effort to save students the cost of purchasing a code to access these activities, the instructor has created

supplemental vocabulary, culture, and listening assignments. Students access and submit these activities through Canvas. These activities are always due on the last day of the subunit, although students should be completing some of them each day to better retain the information.

- Vocabulary assignments: through Quizlet (Option A self-test; Option B short essay) Detailed instructions on which kinds of activities to complete and how to save the work are on the course Canvas page.
- Culture/listening/speaking: Powerpoint slides, online Youtube videos, and other recordings provide students with additional information and extra listening/speaking practice outside of class. Directions for each activity are found on Canvas as well.
- 3) Textbook assignments (necessary to participate in class activities)
 - You will sometimes be asked to read passages in the textbook in preparation for a class period. The due dates for these assignments are listed on the syllabus.

I expect you to complete the preparatory work carefully. However, it is natural to make mistakes on these kinds of assignments. Errors will not affect your grade if sincere effort was put into the assignment. If you do your preparatory work to the best of your abilities and turn it in on time, it will be marked "complete." Assignments that are missing, partially finished, or late will be marked "incomplete."

All students in German 201/211 are also required at the end of each unit to complete and turn in one short essay assignment. Topics and due dates are listed in the syllabus.

NOTE: These preparatory assignments are independent of online, asynchronous class hours!

CLASS PARTICIPATION

Active class participation is essential. In order to complete German 201/211 successfully, students must come to class prepared and ready to discuss assigned materials. **This includes online class participation!**

TESTS AND EXAMS

At the conclusion of chapters 9, 10, 11, and 12, tests are given in order to assess which skills/content you have mastered and which skills/content you may want to focus on more in the next unit. The exact dates for all exams can be found in the course syllabus. (Note: As previously mentioned, it is natural to make mistakes when learning a new language – even in end-of-unit assessments like tests! For this reason, students will have the option to earn back test points for unit tests if they are unsatisfied with their scores and want to demonstrate that they have mastered the course material. There is more information on this process in Canvas.)

<u>Final Exam</u>: The final exam for the course will be a proficiency-based assessment called the <u>STAMP</u> <u>4s</u>. This online assessment will be administered on each campus during the regularly scheduled final exam period in either an official language lab (e.g., the LRC in GMH 321 at UWL) or other designated room with technology accommodations. This proctored exam will identify your listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills on the <u>ACTFL proficiency scale</u>. You will receive full credit for the final exam regardless of proficiency outcome as long as you put forth a sincere effort and

complete the assessment in its entirety. (Note: If you are uncomfortable using a language lab computer and/or headset due to Covid concerns, please let your instructor know as soon as possible.)

A great opportunity! Students are expected to achieve at least a Novice-High proficiency level in the four skills by the end of German 201/211. Some students may, however, exceed this benchmark on the final exam. If you score at an Intermediate-Mid or higher level, you can receive the Global Seal of Biliteracy. This is an internationally recognized credential that provides a badge for your LinkedIn profile, and you can add it to future resumes and graduate school applications to showcase your German language abilities!

Make-ups for tests and exams will be permitted only in the most exceptional cases when students make an appeal in a timely fashion.

Furthermore, while you are encouraged to seek assistance outside of class from your instructor or your course facilitator if needed, you may **not** seek help from other people, e.g., friends, family, exchange students, etc. This is a form of cheating.

Informal Complaints

If a student has a concern or a complaint about a faculty member or course, the general process for making **informal complaints** is outlined in steps 1-3 below. - 1. The student should speak directly to the **instructor**.
- 2. If the student is uncomfortable speaking with the instructor, or they are unsatisfied with the solution, they should go to the **chair** of the faculty member's home department.
- 3. If the student is uncomfortable speaking with the department chair, or the chair is the faculty member in question, the student should speak with their **college dean**.

Depending on the specifics of the student's concern, it may be helpful for them to reach out to additional offices:

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- Complaints/concerns/grievances about **grades**, **teaching performance**, **course requirements**, **course content**, **incivility**, or **professional ethics** should follow the process outlined above. Students may also wish to seek support from the Student Life Office.
- Complaints/concerns/grievances related to **bias** and/or **discrimination** may follow the process outlined above, and in addition or instead students may contact the <u>Center for Transformative Justice</u> office and/or submit a bias incident report.
- Complaints/concerns/grievances related to sexual misconduct may begin with the process
 outlined above, but will need to also involve the Office of Title IX. Students should know
 that faculty members are mandatory reporters of sexual misconduct, but that confidential
 resources, including Violence Prevention, are available to them.

Organization of *Auf Geht's!* Our textbook is not a grammar primer. Units in the textbook and the accompanying online activities are organized around cultural themes that beginning and intermediate speakers of German will encounter if and when they travel to Germany or interact with Germans. Units are subdivided into four subunits, each of which we will cover over two or three days. Although the entire textbook focuses on cultural vocabulary, cultural context, and cultural interactions, it is not possible to learn German successfully without consciously learning about how the language is put together correctly. All along the way, we will reflect on grammar points that are necessary for speaking German accurately in context.

Approach to preparatory assignments: Prior to every class, you should **first** complete the vocabulary, **then** the cultural activities on Canvas, **then** the assigned exercises in the textbook, and **finally** the course packet grammar assignments for that day.

Note: The entry next to each date shows the material (*Lehrstoff*) to be covered on that day and the preparatory assignments (*Hausaufgaben*) to be completed **before** class that day. The Quizlet, grammar, and culture assignments will receive any needed feedback at the conclusion of each subunit.

<u>Note</u>: The course syllabus should be viewed as a "tentative" plan for the semester. Students should check Canvas/e-mail frequently for possible changes.
