COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Introduction to epidemiology and pathogenesis of select neurodegenerative diseases. Through lecture, quizzes, assignments, literature reviews, online-learning modules etc., students will develop knowledge about the impact of select neurodegenerative diseases on individuals and families; as well as the etiology, pathogenesis, morphology and clinical course of select neurodegenerative diseases.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

When this course ends, learner participants will be able to:

- 1) Differentiate between various types of neurodegenerative diseases to include etiology, pathogenesis, morphology, and clinical course.
- 2) Recognize risk factors for neurodegenerative diseases.
- 3) Identify lifestyle factors that can be modified regarding neurodegenerative diseases.
- 4) Summarize risk reduction strategies for preventing the development of neurodegenerative diseases.
- 5) Utilize various clinical assessment tools (MMSE, CDR) to gauge levels of cognitive decline.
- 6) Recognize the impact dementia has on caregivers.
- 7) Recognize the importance of interprofessional collaboration in the care of patients suffering from neurodegenerative disease.
