C. <u>COURSE DESCRIPTION:</u>

Examine major diseases and disorders at systemic levels of the body. Explore risk factors, causes, social determinants and intervention strategies within the context of evidence-based practice and public health recommendations. **Prerequisites:** none.

- 3. Link prevalence of common disorders to congenital, environmental, and lifestyle factors.
- 4. Discuss common disease in terms of etiology, risk factors, and preventive efforts.
