Course Description

Mus 210 - Extension of applied skills, analysis, and composition in chromatic idiom Mus 212 – Advanced aural musicianship skills

Musicianship 210/212 is a continuation of the skills developed in Musicianship 110/112 and 111/113. The students will further develop their written, analytical and aural music skills through written exercises, singing, keyboarding, improvising, dictation, Practica Musica, multitrack recording exercises, composition, harmonization and other methods. Skills and concepts will be practiced and performed on keyboards, vocally, and on the student's major instrument.

Academic Professionalism

Attitude: Students will be most successful in this course (and others) if they approach the material with open minds, positive attitudes and diligent work/practice habits.

Attendance is integral for success in this course. Students are allowed three unexcused absences for the semester. Absences are considered excused at the discretion of the instructor. Additional absences will result in one third of a letter grade (e.g. A to A-, A-to B+, etc.) per absence and can affect both courses. Tardiness must be avoided, as in your professional careers. Repeated lateness will be considered an absence.
