## **Course Overview:**

Students will learn principles and verbal techniques to communicate the values of natural history and cultural features to visitors at parks, recreation areas, museums, and other institutions.

#### **Learning Outcomes:**

- 1. You will be able to explain what personal interpretation is and identify the principles and concepts of effective personal interpretation programs.
- 2. You will be able to create and deliver various types of personal interpretation programs using techniques discussed in class.
- 3. You will be able to evaluate personal interpretation programs using criteria discussed in class.

These course learning outcomes address broader campus-wide learning outcomes related to applying discipline-specific standards of oral communication and critiquing peers' oral presentations to provide feedback.

#### **Attendance and Active Class Participation:**

To develop as a confident, effective, and creative communicator, you must actively participate in the class learning community. Each unexcused absence on discussion presentation days will result in a deduction of 20 points. Let your instructor know via email if you need to be excused and why.
