This course guides graduate students through the process of developing a research question, reviewing the literature, exploring quantitative and qualitative approaches to data collection and analysis, and writing a preliminary thesis proposal.

At the end of the course, students will be able to

- 1. Write a clear research question and/or hypothesis.
- 2. Use the UWSP library and other resources to locate literature appropriate to their field of study.
- 3. Critically read primary literature.
- 4. Follow ethical guidelines for conducting human subjects research.
- 5. Explain quantitative, qualitative, and mixed methods approaches to social science research.
- 6. Write a short research proposal.
