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COURSE DESCRIPTION

Environmental policies reflect conflicts over different values. This course addresses the formal and informal processes that transform different values into policies. We emphasize key elements:

- 1. popular attitudes and values regarding environmental issues,
- 2. how groups organize and compete to influence the formulation of environmental policies, and
- 3. how the political system shapes what can be accomplished by environmental policies.

Students conclude by applying what they have learned to a single area of environmental policymaking.

- explain how features of the political process shape what environmental policies are enacted.
