#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course is designed to provide you with an overview of the U.S. health system, its components, and the players that challenge the health policies. My goal is to present broad perspectives for understanding the U.S. health system within historical, social, political, and economic contexts that shape the health of Americans.

Broadly, we will discuss the five aspects of U.S. health politics and policies throughout the course. First, we begin by discussing the major characteristics and the beliefs and values underpinning U.S. health politics and policies. Second, we delve into the history of the system, describing the initial development and evolution of the system (*Foundations*). Next, we focus on the structure and process of the U.S. health care system, addressing the types of care and special populations for special care (Process). Third, we learn about each of the components of the system, including human resources and nonhuman resources such as finance and reimbursement (*Resources*). Fourth, we devote some time to discussing the issues and concerns about U.S. health politics and policies (*Outcomes*). We end the course by discussing the future of our healthcare system (*Outlook*).

# **LEARNING OUTCOMES**

At the end of this course, you will:

- 1) Explain the components and workings of the U.S. health care system and the U.S. public health infrastructure
- 2) Understand the evolution of the U.S. health system and the influencing factors for the changes
- 3) Analyze the connections and interconnections between the components of the health care system
- 4) Identify the role of many players that have shaped the health politics
- 5) Scrutinize the complex socio-ecological issues that surround health and healthcare in America which create health disparities
- 6) Evaluate the existing health policies and recommend options for policy change.

#### **GRADING SCALE**



#### **COURSE FORMAT**

When you visit the course site in Canvas, you will see **FIVE Modules**. During the 4-week semester, we will cover five modules. Module 1 is the introduction of the course, and you are invited to meet your classmates via "video presentations". These activities ('Introduce Yourself Forum" & Peer Reviews) in Module 1 are also a part of graded assignments. For the remaining modules (M2-M5), we will cover the main subjects regarding the U.S. Health Politics and Policies. Each module is supposed to be completed within a week.

Although the official class period of POLI 306 starts on June 26 (Monday) and ends on July 21 (Friday), I extended a few more days to the course calendar to make **each week repeat the same format (M2-M5)**. In this way, **you can easily follow the course**. That is, the last day of our class will be July 23 (Sunday).

#### **ASSIGNMENTS**

- Practice Quiz: you will review learning materials and take a module quiz by Saturday. For a
  maximum outcome, you should read the chapters BEFORE you begin each module. After
  reading the chapters, please review learning materials such as PowerPoint slides with my
  voice lecture, videos, articles, data, and others. A module quiz is a learning tool to help you
  see how well you understand the course material.
- Module Activities: you need to complete the module activity by Sunday. The module activity
  could be the discussion forum where you are invited to express your opinion or a brief analysis
  of the given data or something else that is related to the topic of the module. Whatever the
  activity it is, clear instruction will be provided in the module. Reviewing the textbook chapter
  and learning materials is sufficient to complete a module activity.
- Health Plan Evaluation Paper: you are invited to evaluate your own health insurance plan according to the criteria provided by the instructor. This assignment requires that you have access to your health plan documentation. Please locate this document as soon as possible. If it is impossible for you to access your health plan, please email me with an explanation by 11:59 PM, June 28 (Wednesday) so that I can assign you a randomly selected plan widely used in Wisconsin. But, try to find your own health insurance plan first. Please check the course site in Canvas for the complete paper guideline.
- Analytic Essay: You are invited to watch the documentary featuring several topics discussed
  in class and write an analytic essay. Please check the course site in Canvas for the complete
  paper guideline.

#### **GENERAL RULES**

All modules will be open at once, so you can complete them in advance if you want. Any unexcused late submission will be downgraded (10% for each day it is late). Late work will be accepted up to 4 days from its original deadline. Please note that late work for Module 5 activities (Practice Quiz & Assignment) and the analytic essay will be accepted by July 25 (Tuesday).
