

ABNORMAL PSYCHOLOGY PSYC 351 ONLINE – Section 2

Fall, 2019 § University of Wisconsin - Stevens Point

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I. Course Description

This course focuses on the research-based examination of the classification, causes, origins (etiology), and treatment of the major psychological disorders such as anxiety and mood disorders, schizophrenia, personality disorders, disorders of childhood, and neurological disorders. Given the online nature of this course, content will be delivered via the required textbook readings, powerpoint slides with recorded and captioned audio, and required videos. Assignments will include weekly activities, discussions, peer reviews of other student's work, and a research paper. Assessments include weekly quizzes and four exams. Case studies are used heavily to facilitate learning.

II. Course Structure

This course will be delivered entirely online through the course management system Canvas. You will use your UWSP account to login to the course from the <u>Canvas Login Page</u>. If you have not activated your UWSP account, please visit the <u>Manage Your Account</u> page to do so.

III. Prerequisites

The prerequisite for this course is that students have completed PSYC110, Introduction to Psychology.

VII. Course Objectives

The main goal for this course is that students gain a better understanding of the various mental health disorders and an appreciation for the complexities that are involved in early identification, diagnosis, and treatment of these disorders. By the end of the course, students will be able to accomplish the following objectives:

- 1. Identify the historical and cultural foundations of mental health
- 2. Differentiate various theoretical perspectives of abnormal behavior
- 3. Explain the factors that contribute to the development of psychopathology
- 4. Describe the assessment process required for mental health diagnosis
- 5. Apply DSM-5 diagnostic criteria to specific case studies
- 6. Demonstrate an understanding of appropriate treatment for various mental health disorders
- 7. Explain how patient demographics impact diagnosis and treatment of mental health disorders
- 8. Critically evaluate research and popular media in the field of abnormal psychology

In addition to these course objectives, throughout the course my goal as a professor is also to enhance empathy for people experiencing psychological disorders, to recognize the strengths of individuals and the resources in their environments, and to encourage class discussion about behaviors that are often stigmatized by our society while respecting/maintaining anonymity.

You will meet the outcomes listed above through a reading, viewing, and studying the course materials presented for each chapter on Canvas, by completing the required activities, discussions, and quizzes, and finally by showing mastery of the material on four required exams.

VIII. Class Expectations

In this course you will be expected to complete the following types of tasks.

- Communicate via email
- Complete basic internet searches
- o Download and upload documents to the LMS (Canvas)
- Read documents online
- View online videos
- Participate in online discussions
- Complete quizzes/tests online as scheduled. Communicate effectively prior to the due date regarding barriers.
- Upload documents to Canvas to submit an assignment
- Take responsibility for your own learning *throughout* the semester. Don't expect extra opportunities at the end to raise your grade. Over-study at the beginning to ensure a good start.

IX. Evaluation of Performance

Evaluation of student performance will be based on completion of required activities, papers, quizzes, discussions, and exams. Final grades will be calculated based on weighted percentages. Click the Grades link to see current grades. Overall assignments and accompanying points are listed below:

<u>Exams</u>: There will be four exams over the course of the semester, which are each 50 points. Average exam grade is weighted as 50% of your total grade. Exams in this course will be a combination of multiple-choice questions and short answer/essay questions. You will be notified regarding format of each test through a study guide. The final exam will NOT be cumulative. Exams are intended to be closed-book and taken individually. Further details will be posted regarding format. Any student caught cheating will receive a score of zero on the exam, as per the academic integrity policy listed below.

<u>Quizzes:</u> Regular quizzes will be held throughout the course in efforts to assess your understanding of material as you progress. These questions should also prepare you for the type of questions you may see on the exams. These are listed on the assignments page and within each chapter's page on Canvas. You will typically have a 72-hour window to complete each of these quizzes. Each quiz will be 10 questions and worth 10 points. There will be no opportunity to earn these points once the quiz has closed. It is your responsibility to make sure you do not miss a quiz. Average quiz grade is weighted as 10% of your total grade.

<u>Discussions:</u> Five times throughout the semester you will see a discussion question or two that you need to respond to. Details of how to do this and what is expected for credit are included on Canvas. Each discussion is worth 4 points. You will also be automatically assigned to be the moderator of this discussion once during the semester. You may earn up to 20 additional points for being an effective moderator of the discussion. Details and grading for moderation are also specified on Canvas. Discussion grade is 10% of your total grade for the course. **IMPORTANT: You will not see this assignment as moderator on your Canvas Calendar!** Groups are randomly assigned to approximately 5 students in each group. You will see members listed. Moderator order will be in alphabetical order by last name. The first person alphabetically is the moderator for discussion #1, and so forth. For groups with only 4 people I will be moderator for the last discussion. Please ensure you know what discussion you are responsible for and put this in your own personal calendar. For each day you do not post as moderator you lose a point, if not more.

<u>Weekly activities:</u> Nearly every week you will also see an activity or one-page response paper that is required. Again, details are specified on Canvas. Each will also be worth 5 points. Activity grade is 10% of your total grade for the course.

<u>Research paper with peer reviews:</u> Each student will work to research and summarize information on a specific psychological disorder or group of disorders. Details of this assignment are specified on Canvas.

Each student should find two articles relating to a specific disorder that either complement each other or offer different perspectives on the same topic. This paper will be broken down throughout the semester so progressive parts are due at various points. Details of this project will be included on Canvas, but the overall goal of the project is NOT to describe the disorder from the textbook, but to identify research articles on the disorder and then to read and summarize these findings. There will also be two required peer reviews that each student will need to conduct. This will enable you all to learn from each other about various disorders while also fine-tuning your own writing skills while reading the writing of others. Submitting your first draft on time is worth 10 points. Your final paper will be worth 40 points, with each peer review worth 20 points. You will not be allowed to complete a peer review until your own draft has been turned in according to the deadlines posted. This paper's grade is 20% of your total grade for the course.

All assignments for this course will be submitted electronically through Canvas on a Word document unless otherwise instructed. Assignments must be submitted by the given deadline or special permission must be requested from instructor before the due date. Extensions will not be given beyond the next assignment except under extreme circumstances. All discussion assignments must be completed by the assignment due date and time. Late or missing discussion assignments will affect the student's grade.

Extra credit will NOT be available in this course. Please use all opportunities in the class to earn the points you desire. Missing an activity or discussion can quickly begin to lower your grade. Make these dates a priority as there is not a chance to make up these points once they are missed.

Final grades of "Incomplete" will be given only under extreme circumstances. An Incomplete is not an option for students who feel overwhelmed by academics, work schedules, or extracurricular activities.

XI. Make-up Exams and Late Assignments

Make-up exams will be offered only under extreme circumstances (e.g., death in family, accident, medical emergency) decided on a case-by-case basis. To qualify for a make-up exam, students must: a) provide a valid, documented excuse for missing the exam, b) contact the professor prior to the exam or within <u>48 hours</u> of missing the exam, and c) schedule a make-up exam within <u>one week</u> of the missed exam. Failure to provide adequate documentation for missing an exam will result in a score of zero points for the exam. Final grades of "incomplete" will be determined in the same way. Unless your situation is an emergency, you need to inform me about missing the exam BEFORE it occurs.

Canvas submission of required assignments on indicated due date is required to receive full credit (Do not email assignments). Assignments submitted late will result in a 10% reduction in credit per day.
