**Course Description:** This course provides an overview of psychological disorders, including pertinent diagnostic information, possible etiologies, and common treatments. Course topics include: neurodevelopmental disorders; schizophrenia spectrum and other psychotic disorders; bipolar and related disorders; depressive disorders; anxiety disorders; obsessive-compulsive and related disorders; trauma- and stressor-related disorders; dissociative disorders; somatic symptom and related disorders; eating disorders; substance-related and addictive disorders; neurocognitive disorders; and personality disorders.

Course Objectives & Learning Outcomes: The main goals for this course are to recognize and classify psychological disorders, understand the basic process of diagnosis, and understand possible etiologies and treatments of psychological disorders. Specific learning outcomes for the course include:

- Students will be able to categorize and discriminate specific psychological disorders.
- Students will be able to identify how psychological disorders impact life experiences and daily living.
- Students will be able to analyze, compare, and contrast psychological disorders for a deeper understanding of the disorders.
- Students will be able to distinguish possible, appropriate treatments for a variety of psychological disorders.
- Students will be able to distinguish possible etiologies for psychological disorders.
- Students will be able to apply knowledge obtained about psychological disorders by providing diagnoses based upon case examples provided.

# Course Assignments & Grading

#### Exams (300 pts)

There will be three regular exams given during the course of the semester. Each regular exam will cover the specific chapters assigned for that exam period (noncomprehensive) and will consist of multiple choice and matching questions. The questions will be derived from lectures (in class and assigned out-of-class video lectures), the textbook, videos, and the assigned readings. Please refer to the course calendar for examination dates.

#### Papers (100 pts)

There will be two short papers written in "blog" style. You will choose a psychological disorder or problem for each paper and write a 450-550 word blog post addressed to individuals who may have that problem that 1) discusses common symptoms and 2) gives some research-based self-help tips. These blogs will require you to seek out and use sources other than your book. #### Reading & Viewing Quizzes (150 pts)

For the online portion of the course, you will complete readings from the book and other assigned sources (see D2L), as well as watch films. You will also be responsible for some powerpoint lectures. There will be online quizzes to check your learning from these sources due by midnight on each Tuesday of the semester. Each quiz is worth 15 points.

# **Class Policies:**

**Assignments:** Assignments are to be turned in exactly as described on D2L. Read it and follow the directions. Also, make sure you read any supporting documents posted on D2L—I spend time on those to give you more information on HOW to do an assignment, as well as give information on how it will be evaluated. You are responsible for following the directions in these documents. Any deviation from these assignment directions that I have not personally permitted will result in a grade of zero points on the assignment.

**Make-Up Exams and Late Assignments:** Make-up exams will be offered only under extreme circumstances (e.g., death in family, accident, medical emergency) decided on a case-by-case basis. In order to qualify for a make-up exam, students must: a) provide a valid excuse for missing the exam (e.g. letter from physician) and b) schedule a make-up exam within one week of the missed exam, <u>at a time that is convenient to the instructor</u>. Failure to provide adequate rationale for missing an exam or providing false information or documentation will result in a score of zero points for the exam.

Assignments must be turned in as assigned to receive full credit. Assignments not submitted by the designated due date and time will result in at least a 10% reduction in credit per day, with a late deduction day beginning 1-hour after the designated time due has passed.

**Respect:** Students enrolled in this class are expected to be respectful of each other and the professor. Right now your job is to be a student, and a professional student is one who comes to class on time and ready to work. Respectful behavior includes, but is not limited to the following:

- Keep cell phones and other electronic devices turned off and kept in bags. When you are in class, it is expected that you behave professionally, which means you pay attention to the class material exclusively.
- When other students are presenting material to the class, or are asking questions, pay attention. Be equally if not more attentive to your classmates as you are to me.

**Attendance**: This class is a Hybrid class, which means that you are required to attend the weekly in-class faceto-face lectures. Attendance is <u>mandatory</u> for that 1.5 hours a week. You will not be penalized if you have 1 absence (for whatever reason). However, any absences over 1 will result in an automatic reduction, per absence, on your final grade in the course with only 2 exceptions, both of which must include prior notification: 1) college-events such as athletics or research conferences or 2) military duty. Do not waste your 1 allowed absence—if you misuse it and then really need it later (i.e. you get really sick), I will not make an exception.

#### Extra Credit & Rounding Policy:

IF extra credit is awarded in the class, final grades will not be rounded. If there is no opportunity for extra credit, the instructor may choose to round within a half-percentage point. Excessive rounding contributes to grade inflation and will not be awarded under any circumstances. Extra credit is not up for individual negotiation. The only guaranteed way to receive the grade you want for the course is to earn it through your performance on regular course assignments.

**Incompletes:** Incompletes will only be given in extreme circumstances (e.g., medical emergency) with proper documentation (e.g., doctor's note). An incomplete is not an option for students who feel overwhelmed by academics, work schedules, or extracurricular activities. Typically, incompletes must be completed within one semester, otherwise an "F" will result.
