Course Description

This course is designed to take an academic, scientific, sociocultural, and practical approach to abnormal behavior and its associated outcomes.

Course Objectives

By the end of this class, students should:

- a. Understand fundamental concepts and vocabulary found in the text.
- b. Compare and contrast various models/theories on deviant behavior.
- c. Recognize biases or limitations in writings as they relate to abnormal behavior and be able to anticipate the possible implications of these biases.
- d. Discuss biological and environmental factors to deviant behavior.
- e. Classify various types of disorders, their behaviors, possible causes, and the various clinical and medical remedies used to treat them.
- f. Discuss group factors that affect the behaviors and attitudes of individuals.

Assignments and Assessments

Exams:

3 exams will be given throughout the semester to assess your understanding of course content. It is imperative that you do all of the readings in your textbook, as not all of the information you will be tested on is provided in the lectures. All exams will consist of 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice) worth 2 points each. They will become accessible on Canvas at the beginning of their respective week, and due on the Sundays at 11:59pm of those weeks.

Honorlock will be used to proctor the exams. You are responsible to make sure your computer is adequate. With Honorlock, you will be recorded (video + Audio + computer screen) while taking the exam. No other information will be recorded. Beside Honorlock personnel, your professor will be the only one accessible to your recordings.

Papers:

You are required to write four papers which will help you reflect on course-relevant topics and broaden your understanding of abnormal psychology. They will be approximately 2 pages in length and follow the APA style (1-inch margin, double-spaced, and in 12-point Time New Roman font). Your name and assignment title must only be on the cover page (which is not counted as the body). Please proofread before submitting! Points will be lost for spelling and grammar issues.

In class activities/discussion:

Through out the semester, 10 online discussions will be assigned. All of them will be on Canvas, please check the course schedule at the end of the syllabus on their assigned dates.

Note: All assignments will be completed on Canvas. You will have at least 1 week to complete the assignments.
