# **Course Policies**

<u>Test and Quizzes:</u> There will be no make up quizzes, dictations or tests. If you miss a quiz, dictation, test or exam without a valid excuse (illness, family emergency), you will receive a zero for this test. *It is your responsibility to inform the instructor of your absence BEFORE the scheduled test.* 

<u>The Final Examination</u> will be one hour in length and will consist of the same kinds of activities and tasks represented on the lesson tests. The final exam for this course will be held on December 14, from 9:55 p.m. -10:50 p.m. to accommodate schedules for all three campuses.

<u>55 minute Tests</u> (one class period) will normally be given after every lesson. All tests will be comprehensive, that is, each one will cover material from previous lessons. More detailed information will be provided in advance of each lesson test.

Attendance: Since proficiency is acquired only through regular and active contact with the target language, you are expected to attend class on a daily basis. I will take attendance daily. If you are unable to attend a class, please contact Natalia Roberts via email at nroberts@uwlax.edu prior to the class session.

<u>Homework Expectations:</u> You can expect to spend approximately 1-2 hours of time on homework for every hour in class. This course entails regular work with Listening Comprehension Audio Program to accompany Golosa Textbook.

Homework is due at the beginning of each class. No late homework will be accepted without a legitimate excuse (e.g., illness). If you know that you will have to miss class on a particular date, submit your homework assignment in advance and you will still receive the homework points for that day. Homework will usually be a PASS/FAIL grading item worth 10 points for each day. It will to be collected at the end of each week (on Thursday).

# **Policy on Incomplete Grades:**

Incomplete grades are awarded only because of illness or other unusual circumstances BEYOND THE STUDENT'S CONTROL. The student must submit official evidence and discuss the situation with the instructor.

<u>Communication about Class Interruptions:</u> In the event of a campus incident that impacts the availability of teaching spaces, any changes or cancellations will be communicated to you via your university email account. <u>Student Evaluation of Instruction (SEI)</u>: UWL conducts student evaluations electronically. Approximately 2 weeks prior to the conclusion of a course, you will receive an email at your EagleApps address directing you to complete an evaluation for each of your courses. In-class time will be provided for students to complete the evaluation in class. Electronic reminders will be sent if you do not complete the evaluation. The evaluation will include numerical ratings and, depending on the department, may provide options for comments. **Expectations for Graded Work:** I provide students feedback and/or scores on assignments that require individualized grading before a further assignment of a similar format is due. Generally, I return work that requires individual feedback within 14 days from the date the work was due. I will notify you if I am unable to grade the work within the 21-day time-frame, and will identify a revised return date. If you submit work after the due date, it may not be returned within 14 days. Your graded coursework will be returned in compliance with FERPA regulations, such as in class, during my office hours, or via the course management system through which only you will have access to your grades. After you have completed the course, any copies or records of your graded material that I retain will be accessible up to 7 weeks into the next academic term.

**Inclusive Excellence (IE):** IE is UWL'S and UW System's diversity initiative. It has three key aspects:

· IE focuses on historically excluded, marginalized, or underserved groups.

• IE asks us to shift our assumptions about diversity issues from a "deficit model" (e.g., assuming that the main reason some students don't succeed as well as other students is because something is wrong with or lacking in the less successful students) to a collaborative model (e.g., assuming that the institution is not successful unless all its members succeed).

 $\cdot$  IE promotes the idea that campus success is everyone's responsibility, not just that of the campus experts on diversity.
