- complete guizzes and tests online


Course Structure

Quizzes: (150 points)

With the exception of the first week, there will be a quiz on the assigned reading and lecture material each week. Each quiz will be worth 25 points. The six highest quiz scores count. **No makeup** quizzes will be given.

Exams: (200 points)

There will be two exams in this class—a midterm and a final. These exams will cover information from class lectures, guest speakers, audio-visual materials, and the readings indicated on the course schedule. You are responsible for all readings and information presented in class. Any changes to these dates will be announced in class. You will take these exams on Canvas. Each of these exams is worth 100 points.

Discussion Posts (150 points): There will be six discussions post assigned thought the semester. These assignments will be posted with the weekly reading and courses material.

Plan Assignment: (50 points) A paper plan assignment is due during the first portion of the semester. This assignment requires students to detail their plan for the class paper that is due at the end of the semester. This assignment will be submitted on Canvas.

Research Paper: (100 points) This paper is assigned so you can explore a delinquency issue in-depth. It is expected that you will spend a substantial amount of time doing library research on your topic. This paper is to be professionally written, proof-read, and properly cited. Suggested topics and specific guidelines for this paper will be discussed in class.
