## Course Goals and SLOs:

Spanish 101 is the first semester of language study in the sequence of Spanish at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. The primary goal of this course is to develop your ability to understand spoken and written Spanish and to develop skill at expressing yourself in basic situations. You cannot expect to acquire native-like competence in a foreign language in one or two semesters. You can expect to be able to communicate on a basic level with native speakers of Spanish even though you make mistakes. The goal in this course is communicative competence, not grammatical perfection. This class will use reading, writing, listening and speaking activities to enhance your vocabulary and to provide you with opportunities to express yourself in Spanish. You will be introduced to cultural information about Spanish speaking countries including regions of the United States.

This course will facilitate/address the following:

# 1. Enduring Understandings:

Students will understand that...

- learning a foreign language is a doorway to a social medium that provides new information and perspectives about other ways of life
- learning a foreign language does not simply involve a one to one translation from your first language
- learning a foreign language involves utilizing multiple communication skills in order to address common and specific needs

#### 2. Essential Questions:

- How does your first language influence the way you think about language learning?
- How does your first language interfere with learning a second language?

## 3. Course-level SLOs (Student Learning Objectives)

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- participate in conversations about topics including their family and friends, weather and the environment, food, travel
- ask and answer questions
- demonstrate continuing ability to use the present tense
- identify some common beliefs and practices in the Spanish speaking world
- demonstrate emerging ability to narrate in the past tense
- demonstrate the ability to give instructions and commands

#### **Expectations:**

- 1. **Preparation and Participation**: You will be assigned certain sections to study and activities to complete on the Vistas website. These activities to be completed are for practice. They **will be graded based on completion**. It is your responsibility to ensure that you are doing them correctly and understanding the material.
- 2. **Homework**: You will also be assigned other sections to complete on the Vistas website. These activities **will** be graded and this will comprise your grade for "Homework".
- 3. **Quizzes**: There will be **four chapter quizzes**, one for each chapter 1-4, and assigned on the Vistas website. All chapter quizzes will be due at 11:59 pm on the day for which they assigned. You will have access to the quiz from 9:00 am that morning until 11:59 pm that night. You can take the quiz anytime during this period. However, once you start, you will have only 60 minutes to finish the quiz; you will not be able to stop the timer once you start and you cannot leave the test page. In addition, you will be able to submit your answers only once.

**IMPORTANT**: All assigned activities, graded or not, **OTHER THAN chapter quizzes** will need to be done by **11:59 PM on the last day of the chapter**. You will see assignments daily M-R in Canvas to be completed on the VHL site, but you will have a grace period to complete them until the last day of that chapter.

4. Final exam: There will be a final exam at the end of the course which covers chapters 5 and 6.
