Learning Objectives:

> Accessing information

- *Selecting information sources:* students will be able to distinguish among various kinds of information retrieval systems and select those most appropriate for the research need.
 - Information discovery systems
 - o Catalogs, article indexes and databases
 - Web search engines
- Search techniques: students will be able to employ search strategies appropriate to the information retrieval systems selected.
 - o Understands and uses advanced search
 - o Understands and uses Boolean operators, understands and uses truncation
 - o Understands search limits and uses them appropriately
 - o Performs field searching
 - Understands how to refine searches
 - o Identifies key terms and concepts
- Retrieving information sources: students will be able to retrieve information sources of various kinds.
 - o Determines availability of an information source at UWSP
 - o Employs alternatives when an information source is not available at UWSP
 - Manages information effectively

> Evaluating information

- Students will be able to determine the reliability, validity, accuracy, authority, timeliness, and point of view or bias of information sources.
- Students will be able to explain the meaning of "peer-reviewed" and determine whether a journal is peer-reviewed.

Ground Rules: This course is pass-fail only. To pass, students must:

- Attend <u>all</u> classes. As a pass-fail class, attendance is mandatory because the majority of learning takes place in the classroom. In the event of a true **emergency** that would result in a class being missed, it is the student's responsibility to notify the instructor ahead of class. The student must also satisfactorily complete the regular assignment and a turn it in to the instructor by the beginning of the next regular class period. If a class is missed, it is the student's responsibility to get the assignment from the instructor or the course guide. - > Complete & submit <u>all</u> assignments on time. Assignments will be handed out at the end of class and are due at the beginning of the next class period. If an assignment is turned in late, ten (10) percentage points will automatically be deducted from the assignment grade for each day that it is late. If a student receives a score of less than 70% on an assignment, it will be returned to the student who will have one opportunity to redo it and resubmit to it for regrading, however, this option does not apply to assignments turned in late.
- > Complete the final exam. The final exam is scheduled for Thursday, May 17, 2018, 10:15 am 12:15 pm in ALB 107.
- Receive a satisfactory final course score. A final course score of at least 70% (out of 100%) is considered satisfactory to pass the class. The final course grade is represented as a percentage and is calculated as follows: a student's accumulated total points from all assignments and the final exam divided by the total number of points available, minus seven (7) percentage points automatically deducted for each day a student has been absent from class.
