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CLASS MATERIALS

- No text; songs to be chosen by you with my guidance and advice.
- You are expected to purchase materials necessary for satisfactory progress: i.e., sheet music, recording device, etc.
- I will scan any sheet music needed (that I am in possession of) in my office and print it out for you or email it. Anthologies, scores, scripts and vocal selections from my office are for perusal only and will not be loaned out unless for immediate use and return (within twenty-four hours). Sheet music and scores are also available for checkout at Albertson Hall. I will maintain a checkout list of materials taken from the office. Material must be returned in the same condition in which it was loaned. If it is not, you are responsible for its replacement.

CLASS OBJECTIVES

- To develop a fundamentally sound vocal technique that will allow you to interpret the music and lyrics of musical theater pieces according to the acting demands and style of the material.
- This technique shall encompass principles and practices of breath management, support and posture, vibrato, resonance and placement of the voice applied to every style of musical theater (legitimate and contemporary) as well as pop-rock.
- To expand the range, power, flexibility, control, and tonal color palette of your voice.
- To develop technical mastery of a variety of musical theater literature and audition material geared towards your vocal/physical instrument.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- One half-hour lesson per week (14 per semester); time to be arranged.
- Participation in required jury and individual talkback sessions.
- Mastery of songs from the Musical Theater repertoire each semester.

o Freshmen: Two songso Sophomores: Three songso Juniors: Four songs

- o Seniors: Five+ songs
- Songs may be performed in BFA lab classes, outreach concerts, the End-of-Semester Jury or in a lesson.
- Recording all lessons is **required**.
- Performance is required in the BFA Musical Theatre Program End-of-Semester Jury for all students in voice lessons, and functions as the final exam for the course. Performance in the Jury will be waived for seniors in their final semester due to Senior Showcase.

COURSE EXPECTATIONS

- Practice at least 45 minutes per day, 6 days per week. At least 15 minutes per practice session should be spent on vocalization. This daily practice is CRUCIAL to your vocal progress and must be a priority in your scheduling. It is better to do a little each day rather than a lot the day before your lesson.
- Please arrive punctually at your lessons warmed up both physically and vocally, with your music, recording device, and vocal journal.
- Please strive to expand your audition portfolio, with numbers from the following categories:
 - Operetta, Standard Ballad, Standard up-tempo, Great American Songbook, Contemporary ballad, Contemporary up-tempo, Rodgers & Hammerstein, Other "standard" musicals, Sondheim, 16 bars, 8 bars, Jazz/Cabaret, Comedy/special material and/or Patter, Country/Western, Classic Rock, Modern Rock, Contemporary Pop, Contemporary "Theatre Pop/Rock", etc.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

- Attendance is **mandatory** at scheduled lesson times.
- If acceptable notification is provided by you <u>at least twenty-four hours</u> before your lesson time, absence is excused, and will be made up if at all possible. It is the <u>student's</u> responsibility to arrange the make-up lesson with me.
- If less than 24 hour notice is given for missing a lesson for any reason, then the absence will be considered unexcused no exceptions.
- Any lessons due to illness must have a doctor's note confirmation or will be considered unexcused.
- Each unexcused absence will lower your grade by one full degree (i.e., A to B)

SHEET MUSIC PREPARATION

• Music preparation: In an effort to go green and minimize printed paper, I will be playing from digital sheet music viewed on my ipad whenever possible in the lesson. This means that before the lesson, you must scan your sheet music (if it's not already in pdf form), cut it to the appropriate pages, and save it to the OneDrive shared folder that I have made for you, or if in a pinch, email me the pdf.

You can choose to either read from printed music in a traditional three ring binder, or you can choose to read from a pdf viewer on an tablet. HOWEVER, I do not recommend you do so unless you feel comfortable with the software

- and skilled at the ability to make notes and corrections on your digital sheet music. If you think that you won't end up making as many notations if it's digital, then stick with your printed copy.
- Hard copy music preparation: If it's absolutely necessary in a situation to have me play from a hard copy, please have TWO COPIES of your music - one for you to note corrections and suggestions on, and one for me to play from, in a three ring binder, DOUBLE-SIDED and HOLE-PUNCHED. NO PLASTIC SHEETS. If the music is not prepared in this manner, I will not be playing it.

VOICE JOURNAL

• Maintenance of a vocal journal in which you will write what vocalises and songs were worked on at the lesson, what discoveries you made, and what you intend to concentrate on for the next lesson. Make sure this is detailed - quoting specific notes that were given in the lesson is very useful here. Additionally, beyond this, you should include a brief reflection/response after you've listened to that lesson recording. Label this separately as reflection - this should show your reactions towards what you're hearing, and this reflection should also include a practice plan on how you plan to work the following week in your practice.

I will check this journal twice during the semester. You must bring it to **every lesson**.

END-OF-SEMESTER JURY

All students enrolled in voice lessons will be required to perform in the BFA Musical Theatre Program End-of-Semester Jury. This performance is open to the public, and serves not only as the final exam for the private voice lesson course, but also as a cumulative performance that is designed to showcase your artistic progress based on your semester of study in all program courses. This performance should be the pinnacle of your work throughout the semester, and while it must be worked in voice lessons, could also have been workshopped and developed in Performance Lab and/or other classes.

The performance will consist of 1 full-length solo song, or could instead be a musical scene with a partner. The material will be selected by the student with instructor approval.

The Jury performances will be filmed for evaluation by both musical theatre faculty members, but will also be evaluated by select members of the Theatre & Dance faculty and possibly other professional guest evaluators. These performance evaluations will be discussed with the student as part of the end-of-semester program evaluations. The final grade for the Jury performance will be determined solely by the student's voice lesson instructor, although all of the faculty evaluations will be taken into consideration.

The Jury performance will count for 20% of the student's final grade in voice lessons for the semester.

Seniors in their final semester will be exempt from the Jury Performance requirement due to Senior Showcase.

GRADING CRITERIA

Each lesson will be graded based on the following criteria:

- Promptness (this should go without saying!)
- Thorough preparation
- Positive attitude and ability to integrate instruction into vocal technique and song interpretation
- Individual initiative in selection and preparation of material

Your final grade will be based on:

- Individual lesson grades (50% of final grade)
- Demonstrated improvement in vocal quality, range, and performance skills based on <u>regular</u> practice throughout the semester. (20% of final grade)
- Voice Lesson Journal (10% of final grade)
- End-of-Semester Jury Performance (20% of final grade)

BASIS FOR GRADING

A = Excellent

The student is constantly challenging him/herself in all aspects. Each work session

demonstrates growth and experimentation. The results are individual and reveal understanding and discovery. There is present a consistently high level of professionalism.

B = Above Average

Work consistently goes beyond basics. Creativity and imagination are present on a regular basis. Student shows an above-average command of technical skills.

C = Average

The student seems to adequately comprehend the basic sense of the individual lessons and is generally able to apply these ideas to his/her work.

D = Fair

Although some progress is seen, little evidence is observed of a basic understanding of overreaching technical principles.

F = Poor

Essentially no growth is evident. Major difficulties exist in accomplishing

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the daily work required in regard to individual instruction.

Disabilities: Students with disabilities should contact the Office of Disability Services during the first two weeks of the semester if they wish to request accommodations for this class.

Religious Beliefs: Religious beliefs will be accommodated according to UWS 22.03 as long as the student notifies the instructor within the first three weeks of the beginning of the semester with the days or dates on which he/she wishes to request relief from an examination or academic requirement.
